CAROLINE O'CONNOR • FANNY BRICE •

Caroline O'Connor has the kind of career most performers dream of, having recently returned from the USA after creating the role of Lily Malevsky-Malevitch in the world premiere, Broadway bound musical, *Anastasia*.

From the theatres of Broadway and the West End, to the world's preeminent concert stages, Caroline's international renown shines light not only on her immense creative skills and talent, but also her passion, her dedication, her boundless energy and sheer hard work. She remains one of the most respected, admired and sought after triple threats in show business.

Caroline began her professional career as a ballet dancer with the Australian Opera Company after studying at the esteemed Royal Ballet School in London. She went on to perform extensively throughout the UK and Europe, most notably making her West End leading lady debut in 1995 as Mabel Normand in Jerry Herman's *Mack and Mabel*, earning her first Laurence Olivier Award nomination for Best Actress in a Musical.

At home in Australia, Caroline's credits are firmly stamped in theatrical history. Reviewing her most recent role as Rose in The Production Company's sell-out season of *Gypsy*, the Herald Sun wrote, "*Gypsy* is a star vehicle showcasing luminary Caroline O'Connor in a role that confirms her position in musical theatre royalty." In addition to the recognition she received for her roles as Velma Kelly in *Chicago* (Mo Award, Green Room Award, Australian Dance Award), Anita in *West Side Story* (Mo Award, Green Room Award) and Aldonza in *Man of La Mancha,* Caroline also garnered accolades for her peerless interpreting of Edith Piaf in *Piaf* (Helpmann Award, Green Room Award) and Judy Garland in the world premiere of *End of the Rainbow* (Helpmann Award, Sydney Stage Award) at the Sydney Opera House.

Caroline came to world attention in 2001 as tango dancing 'Nini Legs in the Air' in Baz Luhrmann's Academy Award winning film *Moulin Rouge*. In 2002, Caroline made her Broadway debut as Velma Kelly in *Chicago* at the Shubert Theatre. Following rave reviews, her successful season was extended, and Caroline was later invited to perform at the show's 10th Anniversary Galas in New York and London, alongside legends Chita Rivera and Joel Grey.

The one-woman play *Bombshells*, was commissioned by the Melbourne Theatre Company and written for Caroline by award-winning playwright Joanna Murray-Smith. It played seasons in Melbourne, Sydney and Adelaide before touring to sell-out performances at the Edinburgh Festival, where it won the coveted Fringe First Award. It also played at the Arts Theatre in the West End, where Caroline received her second Laurence Olivier Award nomination for Best Actress in a Play. Caroline has since taken *Bombshells* to America and Canada and it was filmed for Australian television.

In 2008, distinguished Australian playwright David Williamson, penned *Scarlett O'Hara at the Crimson Parrot* for Caroline.

UK theatre credits include: Life of the Party, Gypsy, Chicago, Romance Romance, West Side Story, Hot Stuff, Street Scene, Hold Tight it's 60s Night, Budgie, Showboat, Talent, Baby, Salt of the Earth, Damn Yankees, A Chorus Line, Matador, Cabaret, Is There Life After High School, Me and My Girl, The Rink and Into The Woods.

US credits include: *Assassins* (Milwaukee Rep), *Follies* (Chicago Shakespeare Theatre), *Bombshells* (Milwaukee Rep), *The Hatpin* (New York) and her sold-out concert series *The Girl from Oz* at New York's landmark jazz club, Birdland.

Caroline starred in the English National Opera's production of *On the Town*, and later in Paris at the Chatelet Theatre. She also had the honour of headlining both the BBC Proms' *Hooray for Hollywood* concert, and Stephen Sondheim's 80th birthday celebration at the Royal Albert Hall.

In 2010 Caroline's solo show The Showgirl Within was produced at London's Garrick Theatre.

Caroline became the "toast of Paris" in La Monde when she played Mrs Lovett in *Sweeney Todd* at the Chatelet Theatre.

Caroline has work-shopped two new Broadway musicals with Woody Allen and Hal Prince, both directed by Susan Stroman and in 2012 originated the Broadway role of Miss Shields in the Tony Award nominated *A Christmas Story: The Musical* at the Lunt Fontanne Theatre. She reprised the role the following year at Madison Square Garden, and went on to perform the musical's showstopper "You'll Shoot Your Eye Out", to a televised audience of over seven million people at *The 67th Annual Tony Awards* at Radio City Music Hall.

In a role she seemed destined to play, Caroline was cast as Ethel Merman in the Cole Porter biopic *De-Lovely*, and starred in the Australian film *Surviving Georgia*. She portrayed Les Girls choreographer, Sheila Cruz, in the ABC television film *Carlotta* and has appeared in the cult comedy series *Lowdown*.

Caroline has recorded four solo CDs and appeared on numerous cast recordings and television variety programs.



Australian tenor and composer David Hobson is one of Australia's best-known operatic and recording artists. He has sung many roles for Opera Australia and both state and international opera companies, including his award winning performances of Rodolfo (*La Boheme*) and the title role in *Orphee*.

Other roles include Don Ottavio in *Don Giovanni*, Ferrando in *Cosi fan tutte*, Count Almaviva in *The Barber of Seville*, Nadir in *The Pearl Fishers*, Lindoro in *L'Italiana in Algeri*, Frederic in *The Pirates of Penzance*, The Architect in the world premiere of *The Eighth Wonder*, Eisenstein in *Die Fledermaus*, the title role in *Candide*, Danilo in *The Merry Widow* and Aristaeus/ Pluto in *Orpheus in the Underworld*.

In 2014, David performed the role of Caractacus Potts in Chitty Chitty Bang Bang.

Special engagements include appearing with the San Francisco Opera in the world premiere of *Dangerous Liaisons*, a performance in the Great Hall, Canberra for Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth, Schubert's *Winterreise* for the Queensland Symphony Orchestra and singing the national anthem at the AFL Grand Final. He has performed his own show at the Sydney Opera House and at the Adelaide Cabaret Festival.

He is also well known from his appearances on *Carols in the Domain, Carols by Candlelight, Spicks and Specks, It Takes Two, Dancing with the Stars* and as a presenter on the Foxtel arts channel, *STUDIO*. He has recorded numerous albums with many reaching No 1 chart status. The most recent recording, *Endless Days*, is a collection of Celtic favourites.

David has won awards including Operatic Performer of the Year, the Sydney Critics Circle Award, The Age Performing Arts Award for Best Performer in Opera and an Australian Record Industry Association (ARIA) Award.

More recently, David toured in concert with Lisa McCune, Greta Bradman and Teddy Tahu Rhodes and performed the role of Buddy Plummer in *Follies*.



Nancye Hayes AM is one of Australia's favourite theatrical actresses. She is an accomplished actor, dancer, singer, choreographer and director. She began her career with J.C. Williamson Theatres Ltd as a chorus member in *My Fair Lady*. She went on to star in many major musical productions including *Sweet Charity, Chicago, Sweeney Todd, Guys and Dolls* and *42nd Street*.

For The Production Company, Nancye has appeared in *Grey Gardens, Follies, Oklahomal, The Music Man, Funny Girl* and directed *The Boy from Oz, Sweet Charity* and *Gypsy.*

Most recently she has performed in *Sondheim on Sondheim* (Manilla Street Productions), Ruth in *The Pirates of Penzance* (Harvest Rain), Lady Bracknell in *The Importance of Being Earnest* (State Theatre Company SA), and *Beyond Desire* (Neil Rutherford Productions/Hayes Theatre Co), Miss Hannigan in the Australian Tour of *Annie* (GFO), *Murderers* and *Six Dance Lessons in Six Weeks* (Ensemble), *A Little Night Music* and *My Fair Lady* (Opera Australia).

Nancye Hayes has made a significant contribution as a theatre director. Her credits include *Crazy for You* and *The World Goes Round* (Western Australian Academy of Performing Arts), *Australia's Leading Ladies Concert* (Brisbane Festival), *The Wizard of Oz* (GFO/SEL/Macks Entertainment) and *Noel & Gertie* (Christine Dunstan Productions).

Nancye has received Lifetime Achievement Awards from The Green Room, The Sydney Theatre and The Helpmanns.





SUSAN-ANN WALKER

Susan-ann is one of Australia's most established entertainers. With a successful career that began with Jenny-Any-Dots in *Cats*, she went on to feature in *Les Misérables, Godspell,* Elizabeth in Gale Edwards' *Aspects of Love, The Secret Garden* (Martha), *Grease* and *Grease – The Arena Spectacular* (Jan), *Possum Magic* (Grandma Poss), *Pinocchio* (Catchup), *The Sound of Music* (Sister Margaretta), *The Ishmael Club* (Mrs Maggia) and *Menopause the Musical* (Earth Mother). For The Production Company she has appeared as Agnes Gooch in *Mame* and Mrs Strakosh in *Funny Girl*.

More recent credits include *Xanadu* (Calliope/ Aphrodite), *Hello Dolly!* (Dolly Levi), *A Funny Thing Happened on the Way to the Forum* (Gymnasia & understudy Domina), and the Helpmann nominated, Green Room Award winning Australian premiere of *Once*, playing Baruska.

Susan-ann's other great love is cabaret and her one-woman shows include *Desperately Singing Susan* and *Confessions of a Sex Kitten*. She co-produced and starred in the critically acclaimed *Jacques Brel* (2000 Green Room Award), wrote and performed the hit show *Yummy and the Yummy Burlesque Hour* (nominated for Best Cabaret Writing, Green Room Awards 2013).

Television credits include *Blue Heelers, MDA, Winners & Losers, The Dr Blake Mysteries* and the ABC Pilot *Moonman*, along with several commercials and voice-overs.

Susan-ann also runs her own business The Voice Place.



Williamson under the guidance of the legendary Betty Pounder in *Oliver, Man of La Mancha, Fiddler On the Roof,* and then with Aztec Services with *Charlie Girl* and *Godspell,* touring Australia and New Zealand.

Jan also spent time in New Zealand appearing in many theatre and TV productions before returning to Australia and working in both television and theatre. Her credits include *Division 4, Homicide, The Clinic* and *City Homicide.*

Jan's twenty-four years behind the camera as a casting director, most notably for *Neighbours*, saw her credited with the discovery of many of Australia's most talented actors and culminated in her life's story being told on the ABC's *Australian Story*. She has now come full circle and is back acting in the theatre, her first love, and is delighted to be working with The Production Company for the first time with the wonderfully talented cast and crew of *Funny Girl*.

JUST THIS SIDE OF

THE BACKSTAGE ADVENTURE OF

Funny Girl celebrates the life and the talent of Fanny Brice, one of the legendary ladies of the American stage. The saga covers her discovery by producer Florenz Ziegfeld, her triumph in his glamorous Follies, her marriage to playboy gambler Jules (Nick) Arnstein, her tenacity during his imprisonment for stock swindling, and the break up of their marriage after his release.

Real-life Fanny had two children by Arnstein: a son William and a daughter Frances. In 1939 Frances married an up-and-coming Hollywood producer called Ray Stark.

Now read on ..

Ray Stark's *Funny Girl* adventure began shortly after his mother-in-law's death in 1951. He commissioned author Norman Katkov to write an 'official' biography of Fanny, and supplied him with over three hundred pages of Fanny's notes about her life. The result, somewhat unfortunately titled *The Fabulous Fanny*, was serialised in *The Ladies Home Journal* and published in book form by Alfred A Knopf in 1952. Then Fanny's daughter Frances objected to some of the less pleasant material in the book – even though it was taken from Fanny's own

notes – and Stark was forced to pay Katkov \$50,000 to remove *The Fabulous Fanny* from the market.

For some years Stark returned to his principal interest, movie production. Then, in 1961, he commissioned Isabel Lennart to write a treatment for a screenplay on the life of Fanny Brice, a film in the grand tradition of biographical movies such as The Great Ziegfeld (1936), Yankee Doodle Dandy (George M. Cohan, 1942), The Jolson Story (1946) and Look for the Silver Lining (Marilyn Miller, 1949). Interestingly, there had already been two films based on Fanny Brice's life: the now forgotten, Broadway Thru a Keyhole (with Constance Cummings, Paul Kelly and Russ Columbo, 1933) and Rose of Washington Square (1939). In the latter, Alice Faye as Rose Sargent, sang Brice's signature tune 'My Man' and fell for a Nick Arnstein character played by Tyrone Power. Fanny and Nick

sued Twentieth Century-Fox and settled out of court for \$40,000 and \$25,000 respectively.

Several experts suggested to Stark that Isabel Lennart's treatment would work splendidly as a Broadway musical. Stark had the contacts, expertise and initial finance and went into partnership with producer David Merrick to get the show under way. At various times, three directors worked on the project – Jerome Robbins, Bob Fosse and Garson Kanin. Jule Styne was recruited to compose the score (his impressive credits included *Gentlemen Prefer Blondes, Bells Are Ringing* and *Gypsy*, with Stephen Sondheim, also fresh from *Gypsy*, as lyricist. Coral Haney did the choreography.

The creative process took eighteen months. There was no attempt to use any of the songs Fanny Brice had made famous, but Jule Styne wrote several in period idiom, notably 'Sadie, Sadie'. The stand-out numbers, though, were more contemporary in feel; 'People'', a poignant expression of the lonely life of a performer dedicated to making others laugh and the ebullient 'Don't Rain On My Parade', a song strangely similar in style and sentiment to 'Before the Parade Passes By' from *Hello, Dolly.* The latter show opened three months before *Funny Girl* and would pip it to the post as the biggest hit of the season.

The producer's thorniest problem was finding someone to recreate the legendary Fanny Brice, whose unique comedic, singing and dramatic talents were still warmly remembered. The Starks wanted Anne Bancroft, a fine dramatic actress, but with limited vocal capabilities. 'You'll never get anyone to sing those songs', Bancroft lamented, and bowed out. Carol Burnett was offered the role but she considered herself incapable of projecting the ethnic subtleties of Brice's humour. What about Eydie Gormé, Kaye Ballard, Shirley MacLaine? The Starks felt that the show needed a big name in the lead. To Sondheim's amazement they sent the script to Mary Martin: 'Mary Martin? You've gotta have a Jewish girl! And if she's not Jewish, she at least has to have a nose!'



In the spring of 1962, Jule Styne discovered a girl with a nose. Her name was Barbra Streisand. She had found success in a small-scale musical called *I Can Get It For You Wholesale* and she was creating a sensation in cabaret in Greenwich Village. He took the Starks to see her. They thought her too unsophisticated to play the older Fanny Brice that they remembered. 'That girl will never play my mother,' said Fran. 'My mother was something special.'

Nevertheless Ray Stark was finally convinced of Streisand's potential. She was signed in July 1963. But Stark also recognised the risk. He told a friend that Bancroft would have guaranteed one million in advance sales, Burnett, two million and Streisand virtually nothing. 'But if she clicks, she could bring in five million. If we go with the kid.' Sydney Chaplin, son of the great Charlie and a dependable Broadway leading man, was cast a Nick Arnstein. Kay Medford played Mrs Brice.

By this time David Merrick, Jerome Robbins and Bob Fosse had left the project, and Bob Merrill (*Carnival* and *Hello*, *Dolly!*) had replaced Sondheim as lyricist – all victims of an incredible tortuous preproduction process. The situation was not helped by the presence of the real Nick Arnstein, now in his eighties, who Stark had judiciously invited in the hope of avoiding a potential lawsuit. As ever, Arnstein was conning money. Eventually Stark lost patience with him. The old man returned to California where he lived with Lew Brice, Fanny's brother. He died in 1965. He never saw *Funny Girl.*

On 26 March 1964, *Funny Girl* opened at the Winter Garden on Broadway – and, as Shana Alexander wrote in *Life* – 'the entire gorgeous, rattletrap show business establishment blew sky-high.' The reviews were unanimously ecstatic. 'If New York were Paris,' mused the *Times*, 'Broadway could temporarily consider renaming itself

the Rue Streisand. She sets the entire theatre ablaze. She is theatre's new girl for all seasons.' *'Funny Girl'*, added the *World Telegram* and *Sun*, 'is just this side of Paradise.'

As *Funny Girl* hurtled happily on, Streisand and Stark were locked in negotiations. Finally Stark agreed to release her from the Broadway run provided she would star in the London production. With her eyes on Hollywood, Streisand said she'd play London, but only if she could do the movie.... Eventually all was settled and on 26 December 1965, Barbra gave her last Broadway performance as Fanny. It was one of the most memorable nights of her career. She told the packed house, 'I'd like to pay tribute to a great performer, the woman I play in the show. Oddly enough, I'm standing on the same stage where she did her last Broadway show. So as a tribute to her I'd like to sing this song that she made famous.' She than sang *My Man*.

When she finished she was crying and so was everyone else. As the audience held hands and sang *Auld Lang Syne* no one could know that Barbra Streisand would never return to the Broadway stage.

The marathon 1,348-performance Broadway run continued with Mimi Hines and Johnny Desmond succeeding Miss Streisand and Sydney Chaplin. A twelve month national tour began in October 1965. Marion Michaels was Fanny with Anthony George as Nick.

The carbon copy London production, with Michael Craig as Nick, opened at the Prince of Wales Theatre on 13 April 1966. Barbra found English audiences quiet and undemonstrative. With Princess Margaret the Earl of Snowdon in the house, the reaction was even quieter. Afterwards the Princess told Barbra how much she'd enjoyed the show. Barbra looked her in the eye and said, 'You should come back some night when you're not here.'

Streisand signed a four-movie deal with Ray Stark, guaranteeing her the film version of *Funny Girl* for a salary of \$250,000 and a small percentage of the box office. Stark found that the major studios were reluctant to take a punt on the film if Streisand were to star. True, she had been a success on Broadway and on television, but she had neither big screen experience nor drawing power. Columbia were interested but wanted Shirley MacLaine as Fanny. Stark stuck to his guns and eventually talked Columbia round by agreeing to a comparatively small budget for a musical, \$8.5 million. The stage

musical's best songs were retained for the film but the score was supplemented by three of Fanny Brice's successes: *Id Rather Be Blue Over You, Second Hand Rose* and, of course, *My Man.* Miss Streisand's screen debut won her an Academy Award. Leonard Maltin commented: 'Bad as biography, but first-rate as a musical.'

Before this, however *Funny Girl* had come to Australia. J.C. Williamson's managing director, Sir Frank Tait, had seen Streisand in *Funny Girl* in New York in 1964 and had scribbled his thoughts on casting in a program, now preserved in the Performing Arts Museum at Arts Centre Melbourne. Against the character of Fanny Brice he wrote, simply, 'Import'. Clearly he thought that, in the JCW tradition, an



unknown American would be preferable to an Australian, no matter how talented. Sir Frank died in 1965 and it was his successor, John McCallum, who acquired rights for *Funny Girl* for 'The Firm'. The deal was confirmed on 19 January, 1966: \$6,000 on signing and 10% of the gross, plus \$575 on signing and \$20 per week for the use of the original scenic and costume designs.

McCallum determined that the leading role should be cast locally. This put him into conflict with the rest of the board and was one of the reasons that he and 'The Firm' parted company later that year.

John McCallum's announcement that Australia's Fanny was to be Jill Perryman was greeted with amazement and enthusiasm. At thirty-two, Jill was already a music theatre veteran. She had understudied Evie Hayes in *Call Me Madam* and had played second female lead in *Holly Dolly! Funny Girl* premiered at Her Majesty's Theatre in Sydney on 4 March 1966. Jill's success was sensational. McCallum reminisced: 'I knew that Jill could play the part better than anyone that I had auditioned in New York. When the lights went up for the interval on the first night, I knew that we had a success'.

Fred Hebert, the highly experienced American director, cast Bruce Barry as Nick Arnstein. The supporting cast included Bill Yule, Leslie Baker, Jeanne Battye, Neville Burns, Walter Sullivan, Tommy Dysart and Beverley Dunn. The great favourite Evie Hayes – best remembered as the star of Australia's *Annie Get Your Gun* – played Fanny's mother, Mrs Brice. Evie's husband, sprightly vaudeville veteran Will Mahoney, had the character role of Tom Keeney. Will was a living history book.

Not only did he remember the real Tom Keeney, he'd known Arnstein, Ziegfeld and Fanny herself.

The Sydney critics were unanimous in their praise. In *The Australian*, Mungo MacCallum said, 'Jill Perryman is nothing short of brilliant. It is next to impossible to imagine anyone, including Barbra Streisand, in the part.' And *The Telegraph's* Griffin Foley hailed 'A night of theatrical enchantment.'

Funny Girl transferred to Sydney's Theatre Royal in May and played there until it transferred to Her Majesty's Melbourne in August. Sadly during the heat of the Melbourne summer, Will Mahoney collapsed on stage. He was forced to leave the company and died in February 1967. Evie bravely stayed with the tour: Brisbane, Adelaide, Perth and back to Adelaide, where the final curtain fell on 6 May 1967 – a splendid fourteen-month tour of packed, happy houses.

OFRANK VAN STRATEN OAM, 1999

Frank van Straten wrote this article for The Production Company's *Funny Girl* in 1999. This show had a bumpy start as lan Judge, the contracted director, withdrew three days before rehearsals were to start. Gary Young nobly stepped in. The production starred Caroline O'Connor as Fanny Brice and John O'May was Nick Arnstein. Guy Simpson was Musical Director, Ross Coleman Choreographer, Dale Ferguson Set Designer and Bob Murphy designed the costumes. It is hard to believe, looking back, that, in that first season, there were only three performances. It was a triumph with the Herald Sun's Kate Herbert saying 'Caroline O'Connor is a card-carrying musical comedy phenomenon. As Fanny Brice, she is stunningly versatile, attacking with equal skill, gags or drama, choreography or song.'

In recent years there have been several attempts to bring *Funny Girl* back to Broadway but many of them have been stumped by the difficulty of finding a suitable leading lady. A recent production is still running on London's West End (for the first time since Streisand in 1966) but it has not been without its problems. Transferring from a sell-out season at the intimate Menier Chocolate Factory to the Savoy Theatre, it stars Sheridan Smith as Fanny Brice and Darius Campbell as Nick Arnstein. Directed by Michael Mayer with choreography by Lynne Page, Smith received rave reviews with The Times describing her as 'as funny as any girl has ever been' and Time Out saying "only a fool would rain on Sheridan's parade'.

Frank van Straten has written more than fifty program articles for The Production Company and he have made a unique contribution ensuring that our audiences have a history on each musical as well as its Australian connections. In 2016, Frank has taken time off to work on a new project. The Production Company greatly appreciates Frank and we will miss him.





BLAKE APPELQVIST

Canberra-born Blake recently graduated from the Victorian College of The Arts with a Bachelor of Fine Arts (Music Theatre) where he played Bobby Strong in *Urinetown* and Billy Lawlor in *42nd Street*. He was the Leading Soloist in the 68th Annual Dance Sport Championship Opening, was the recipient of the Orloff Family Charitable Trust for excellence, as well as winning the New York Global Atelier Scholarship. Blake's professional debut was playing Diesel in The Production Company's *West Side Story*. In 2015 he reached the finals for the 2015 Rob Guest Endowment Award and most recently understudied the leading role in The Ambassador Theatre Group's *Ghost: The Musical*.



DANIEL ASSETTA

He performed the role of Rum Tum Tugger in the Australian/New Zealand tour of *Cats*. Other credits include *Follies In Concert* (StoreyBoard Productions) and *Carmen, The Magic Flute* and *Tosca* for Opera Australia.



AMY BERRISFORD

Amy graduated from Dance World Studios in 2004 and has worked consistently since in musical theatre, television and film. She is thrilled to be in the cast of *Funny Girl* and dedicates her performance to her Grandma Pam.








ASHLEIGH HAUSCHILD



She has directed for all of Australia's State Theatre Companies, Opera Australia, Victoria State Opera, South Australian Opera Company, New Zealand International Festival of the Arts, English National Opera, Royal Shakespeare Company and the Chichester Festival.

Gale has won multiple awards for her directing, including a Sydney Theatre Award for *Festen*, Helpmann Awards for *The Boy From Oz* and *Sweeney Todd*, Green Room Awards for *The Boy From Oz* and *Manon Lescaut, Salome* and Sydney Theatre Critics Awards for *Coriolanus, The Rover, The Glass Menagerie* and *Les Misérables*.

For The Production Company, Gale has directed *Chess, Guys and Dolls, Gypsy, West Side Story* and *Sideshow Alley.*

Gale directed a new production of *Jesus Christ Superstar*, which had seasons on the West End and on Broadway, receiving a Tony Award nomination and an International Emmy Award for Best Filmed Video Production. Other international work includes *Romeo and Juliet* for Chicago Shakespeare Theatre, *Macbeth* for Oregon Shakespeare Company, *Hamlet, Edward II, Titus Andronicus* and *Richard III* for Washington Shakespeare Company, *Far Pavillions* at the Shaftsbury Theatre London, *Don Carlos* for Royal Shakespeare Company to the Barbican Theatre in London, *St Joan* for The Strand Theatre London and *Aspects of Love* for the Really Useful Company London.

Gale has directed many theatre productions in Australia, some highlights are, *Coriolanus, The White Devil, The God of Carnage, Woman in Mind, Festen* and *The Way of the World*, for the Sydney Theatre Company and *Cat on a Hot Tin Roof, Hitchcock Blonde, M Butterfly, Ghosts* and *Uncle Vanya* for the Melbourne Theatre Company. Gale directed the original production of *The Boy From Oz, Jerry Springer the Opera* for the Sydney Opera House and a new production of *The Rocky Horror Show*. Her operas include *La Boheme, Der Rosenkavalier, Manon Lescaut, The Magic Flute, Maria Stuarda, Salome* and *Katya Kabanova* and most recently, *Aida* on Sydney Harbour and the world premiere season of the opera, *Cloudstreet* for the State Opera of SA.




MUSICAL DIRECTOR •

Anthony works extensively as a freelance musical director, conductor, pianist, orchestrator, arranger and vocal coach. He has conducted the Royal Liverpool Philharmonic Orchestra, the British Philharmonic Orchestra, the Guernsey Camerata Orchestra and the Britten Sinfonia. In January 2014 Anthony was appointed Principal Conductor of the British Sinfonietta after making his debut with the orchestra in concerts featuring the internationally renowned percussionist Dame Evelyn Glennie.

Anthony's musical theatre credits include South Pacific, Blood Brothers, Ken Hill's Phantom of the Opera, A Grand Night For Singing, Chess, Dear World, Cats (Australian Tour), Grease, The Wizard of Oz. Bye Bye Birdie. The Lion King (London's West End, Sydney, Melbourne and Shanghai); and a tenure of almost three years as Musical Director/ Conductor on the West End production of Andrew Lloyd Webber's The Phantom of the Opera - during which time he conducted the record-breaking 10,000th performance of the show. He then was appointed Musical Director for its 25th Anniversary UK Touring Production. Anthony was Musical Director for the UK/International Tour & the 2014/2015 West End Revival Production of *Cats* at the London Palladium. This was followed by workshop/showcase productions of two new musicals, This Is Also England and Just A Man. Most recently, Anthony was Musical Supervisor/Arranger for Seasons of Larson at London's Lyric Theatre.

Anthony's operatic credits include Don Carlo, La Traviata, La Bohème, Madama Butterfly, Il Barbiere di Siviglia, La Cenerentola, Don Giovanni, The Magic Flute, Orpheus in the Underworld, The Little Mermaid, The Moonrakers Opera, The Happy Prince plus numerous gala concerts.

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Kelley is one of Australia's most accomplished performers and choreographers in film, television and musical theatre. Her creative director and choreographer credits for the stage include Opera Australia's *Salome*, The Handa Opera of *Carmen* on Sydney Harbour, *Follies, Footloose, Grease the Arena Spectacular, Hedwig and The Angry Inch, Xanadu, Miracle City* and Hugh Jackman's *The Boy from Oz* and *Fame the Musical,* which both earned her a Helpmann Award for Best Choreography.

As choreographer and guest judge her television credits include *So You Think You Can Dance* (Australia and USA), *Superstars of Dance* (USA) and numerous awards shows and television specials. She has also been the creative director on Australia's *Dancing With The Stars*.

Kelley's film choreography credits include In *Her Skin, Goddess* and choreographer, lead performer and creative motion capture consultant on the OSCAR winning, feature film *Happy Feet.* Her choreography was awarded a Hollywood Media Honours.

Recently, Kelley was the artistic director on John Farnham and Olivia Newton John's *Two Strong Hearts* tour, before working as the associate director to Baz Lurhman on *Strictly Ballroom The Musical*.

Most recently Kelley choreographed another Opera Australia production of *Carmen*.

Kelley is thrilled to be working with Caroline O'Connor, Nancye Hayes and Gale Edwards, and the terrific cast in this production.



Tim's costume design for feature film *The Adventures* of *Priscilla, Queen of the Desert* received an Oscar, a BAFTA and an AFI award.

Following the international success of *Priscilla* Tim relocated to Los Angeles where he continued his work as a designer, while there he worked across various mediums including music videos for Cher and Missy Elliott, television series VIP starring Pamela Anderson and feature films including *Miss Congeniality*.

Returning to Australia, Tim crossed over into musical theatre, revisiting *The Adventures of Priscilla, Queen of the Desert - The Musical* earning him a Tony, a NYC Drama Desk award, an Olivier, a Helpmann, a Green Room Award along with Spain's Premios Teatro award and Canada's Dora award.

For The Production Company Tim has worked with director Gale Edwards designing costumes on *Gypsy, Guys and Dolls, West Side Story,* and *The Pirates of Penzance* with director, Dean Bryant.

Since then, Tim has worked with Dean Bryant on stage productions *Sweet Charity* and *Little Shop of Horrors.*

Continuing his work on television, Tim has designed costumes for *Dancing With the Stars* and *Australia's Got Talent.*
