as Albert Peterson

Philip has enjoyed his love for theatre since the age of seven when he first appeared in a panto for J.C. Williamson's. Not only did his success come through the theatre but also in television, with the ever-popular Young Talent Time. Just prior to going to England in 1984, Philip's career in theatre took off again - first of all with More Canterbury Tales and then with the coveted role of Tony in West Side Story.

Philip lived in London from 1984 - 1993, where he represented Australia in both theatre and television. Performing in such shows as Nite-Club Confidential, Show Boat, Oklahomal, Buddy and 42nd Street as well as productions of Kurt Weill's Street Scene for both the English National Opera and Scottish Opera. He also performed his song from Street Scene, Moon Faced Starry Eyed, in concert with both Caroline O'Connor Catherine Zeta-Jones. Other credits include several Royal Command, Children's Royal and Gala Performances and a special night at the Covent Garden Opera House, where he got to work alongside Princess Diana.

Philip has performed roles in many shows in Australia including Joe Cable in South Pacific, Ralphe Rackstraw in HMS Pinafore, Gaylord Ravenal in Show Boat, George in She Loves Me (opposite Lisa McCune) as well as performances in Company for Melbourne Theatre Company and Forbidden Broadway. In 2001, he played the role of Rooster in Annie (for which he won a Green Room Award) and Lord Evelyn Oakleigh in Anything Goes (also nominated for a Green Room Award). Apart from The Music Man for The Production Company in 2002, Philip's latest venture was playing the role of the Tinman for 14 months in The Wizard of Oz.

He is looking forward to the second half of 2003 with the prospects of opening his own Music, Dance and Acting Academy and also a series of concerts with his family. He is working on an extremely important project called Peace Within with his wife, Kate, which will include a Peace Within concert. This is a huge undertaking and covers a worldwide plan for peace in these troubled times.

TAMSIN CARROLL

as Rose Alvarez

Tamsin's theatre credits include Into The Woods for Melbourne Theatre Company, A Little Night Music for IMG and MTC, The Listmaker for The Bell Shakespeare Company, Long Gone Lonesome Cowboys for Railway Street Theatre and Shout - The Musical for Kevin Jacobsen, in which she played the role of Marianne Ranate.

For her role in Shout, Tamsin was nominated for a Green Room Award (Best Female Artist in a Leading Role) and for two Mo Awards. She starred in the Sam Mendes production of Oliver! in the role of Nancy, which played in Sydney, Melbourne and Singapore. For this performance, Tamsin received a Green Room Award (Best Female Artist in a Leading Role) and a Helpmann Award (Best Actress in a Musical). She was also nominated for a Mo Award. Most recently, Tamsin performed the role of Sheila in Hair for The Production Company and Macks Entertainment.

Her television appearances include Heartbreak High, A Difficult Woman, The Three Stooges and All Saints. Tamsin played the role of Jodie in the feature film Holy Smoke, directed by Jane Campion and starring Kate Winslet.





SPENCER McLAREN

as Conrad Birdie

Spencer McLaren's first role was as the understudy for Tony in West Side Story and then the lead role of Munkustrap in Andrew Lloyd Webber's Cats. A return season of West Side Story and the alternating role of the Beast in Disney's Beauty And The Beast soon followed.

After graduating from the National Institute of Dramatic Art (NIDA) in 1999, Spencer was asked to audition for the role of Richie in *The Secret Life Of Us* and is currently shooting the third series. In 2000, Spencer played opposite Rachael Beck in *Call Me Madam* for The Production Company and in 2001, travelled to Shanghai and Beijing, performing in *Masterpiece - The Music Of Andrew Lloyd Webber* with Elaine Page.

In June of 2002, Spencer played the lead role of Billy Bigelow in the BBC's Carousel at the Royal Festival Hall in London. Spencer then performed the role of Ren McCormack in the stage adaptation of Footloose in Sydney. Recently, Spencer performed in his critically acclaimed one-man show - Spencer McLaren Live At The Chapel and has just finished performing with Tony Award winning composer, Jason Robert Brown, in the orchestral premiere of Songs For A New World, featuring a star studded international cast.



NATALIE O'DONNELL

as Kim MacAfee

Natalie began performing as an original member of the Youth Theatre Company, Doorstep Productions, before being accepted into the Western Australian Academy of Performing Arts (WAAPA) in 1995.

Prior to graduating from WAAPA in 1998, Natalie was cast to make her professional debut in the 10th Anniversary production of Les Misérables for Cameron Mackintosh. Following Les Misérables, Natalie played the lead role in the new Australian musical The Sunshine Club (Rose) for the Sydney Theatre Company.

Most recently she performed in the original cast of the smash hit musical *Mamma Mia!* for Littlestar Services / DCE Group.

Her television credits include South Pacific - the Disney remake starring Glenn Close and Harry Connick Jr. and Water Rats, The Coast, All Saints and Tanya & Floyd.



DARYL SOMERS

as Mr Harry MacAfee

Daryl Somers is synonymous with Australian television as host and executive producer of our longest running variety/comedy show. Hey Hey It's Saturday ran for 28 years on the Nine Network, winning 12 TV Week Logie Awards in the Comedy/Light Entertainment categories. Testament to Daryl's personal popularity is his additional tally of 17 Logies including three prestigious Gold Awards.

But the enormous success in television has clouded his first love ... music! Coming from a musical family, at 15 he joined a band at school, as drummer and vocalist. In a New Faces final in 1968, they placed second to John Williamson of True Blue fame. Two years later, Daryl won the New Faces final as a solo vocalist. He studied with Diane Dubarry and Evie Hayes.

Daryl performed regularly on the Graham Kennedy, Don Lane and Mike Walsh Shows and sang on countless Channel 9 variety specials through the 70s and 80s. Around his television commitments, he worked clubs to concert halls with trios to symphony orchestras. One highlight was singing at the AFL Grand Final in 1987 and again in 1996.

Theatrically, Daryl played many leading roles in 70s pantomime productions. In 1989, he played the Billiard Marker in Mike Batt's The Hunting of the Snark and the role of Sancho Panza in the George Fairfax/Graeme Murphy production of Man of La Mancha.

As patron of many charities, Daryl has used his musical talents to raise money for worthy causes. He is also patron of Generations in Jazz and the Western Australian Youth Jazz Orchestra. Currently, he is Chair of the Contemporary Music Touring Program for the Federal Government, and Deputy Chair of Screensound Australia, our national audiovisual archive in Canberra.



ROBYN

as Mrs Doris MacAfee

Robyn's career in live theatre spans almost three decades. Memorable highlights include Les Misérables (original cast) in the role of Madame Thenardier (Green Room Award). She kept the tea flowing as Mrs Potts in Beauty And The Beast and again, at the Princess Theatre for the smash hit, The Boy From Oz, directed by Gale Edwards. Both cast recordings won Aria Awards.

In Melbourne last year, with Martin Croft, she appeared in and produced the Australian premiere of Stephen Sondheim's Putting It Together and has previously appeared in Side By Side By Sondheim for Q.T.C., Into The Woods (Baker's Wife) in concert and the late Richard Wherrett's production of Company.

Major commercial productions include national tours of Jesus Christ Superstar, Evita, Nunsense (Sister Robert Anne) and How To Succeed In Business Without Really Trying as Smitty.
Crusade (by Craig Christie) in Edinburgh was a highlight of 2000. Robyn is thrilled to be involved in the forthcoming workshop of Gary Young and Paul Keelan's Sideshow Alley (Inaugural Pratt Prize winner), directed by Gale Edwards.

Recent television includes roles in *Blue Heelers*, M.D.A. and *The Secret Life Of Us*. Currently, Robyn can be seen in *Neighbours* as Melody Jones, the acerbic manager of Delta Goodrem.

PERFECT IN

The happy history of Bye Bye Birdie


It's an odd fact that a show that became a Broadway legend arrived at the Martin Beck Theatre on 14 April 1960 with little fanfare and almost no chance of success.

To start with, there was not one box office 'name' in the cast. The leading man, Dick Gautier, was totally new to Broadway and Dick Van Dyke had never attempted musical comedy. Not only was the producer, Edward Padula, totally unknown - so were the librettist, lyricist and composer. Michael Stewart, Lee Adams and Charles Strouse were all tackling their first full-length musical. And although Gower Champion was famous as a dancer and choreographer, he had never before directed

But, somehow, it all worked. Bye Bye Birdie was a smash hit. As John Chapman wryly observed in his New York Daily News review: 'One of the best things about it is that practically nobody is connected with it. It is the funniest, most captivating and most expert musical comedy one could hope to see in several seasons of show going.'

Bye Bye Birdie was the first hit musical about the then new craze of rock and roll. Its hero, Conrad Birdie, was a goodnatured amalgam of Elvis Presley and Conway Twitty, and the show's sunny

Broadway production became legendary.

depiction of American youth was in sharp contrast to the starkness of West Side Story of three years before. Apart from Van Dyke (as Albert Peterson) and Gautier (Birdie), the cast included Chita Rivera (Rose Grant), Kay Medford (Mae Peterson), Paul Lynde (Mr MacAfee) and Charles Nelson Reilly (Mr Hinkle).

Birdie sang merrily for 607 performances at the Martin Beck and garnered the 1961 Tony for Best Musical. Gower Champion received two Tonys - Best Director and Best Choreographer - and another went to Dick Van Dyke for Best Featured Actor in a Musical. The show was still bubbling on Broadway when a second company took off on a ten month national tour. In London, Chita Rivera reprised her role at Her Majesty's Theatre, where the show started a 268 perfomance run on

15 June 1961. Angela Baddeley played Mae Peterson with teen idol Marty Wilde as Birdie.

Before this, however, Bye Bye Birdie had migrated across the Pacific. Early in 1961, J.C. Williamson's, still basking in the triumphs of their production of My Fair Lady, announced that Birdie would commence an Australian tour at Her Majesty's Theatre in Melbourne on 4 March 1961.

As was Williamson's custom, the director and the leads were imported. The show's New York stage manager, Michael Thoma, was engaged to direct. On his arrival, he disarmingly admitted to an Age reporter, 'This is my first big break. None of my other shows were a great success.'

Joining him were Frank Buxton as Albert Peterson and Patricia Finey as Rose Grant, both competent unknowns.

The local recruits were far more interesting: Kevan Johnston (Birdie), Faye Donaldson (Mrs MacAfee), Geraldene Morrow (Kim MacAfee), Grant Taylor (Mr MacAfee), Pat Carroll (Ursula Merkle) and beloved

veteran Fifi Banvard (Mae Peterson).
The ensemble included an amazing collection of emerging young talent, among them Patti McGrath, Laurel
Veitch, Ian Turpie, Alan Bickford, Robert
Olup, Barry Kitcher, Rod McLennan and, later in the run, Gail Esler. Betty Pounder reproduced Gower Champion's choreography and Terry Vaughan and, subsequently, Brian Buggy conducted the orchestra.

The show's premiere was greeted enthusiastically. In *The Age*, Geoffrey Hutton said, 'This novelty is thoroughly enjoyable, and (to use an old-fashioned expression), thoroughly wholesome.' H.A. Standish, in *The Herald*, advised, 'Forget about *My Fair Lady* and *West Side Story* - this stands up well beside anything else we've seen for years.'



Sun's Howard Palmer called it, 'Refreshing, tuneful and humorous,' and added, 'With such a happy show, only a chronic dyspeptic would find any fault at all.'

But there was one 'chronic dyspeptic'. In the intellectual weekly *Nation*, he fumed: 'Someone knowledgeable in the economics of the commercial theatre should explain how it is that a puerile piece like this, crammed with American allusions and attitudes which are lost on an Australian audience, can be treated to a lavish

production at Her Majesty's, while [the Australian musical] Lola Montez has not been sighted in Melbourne since its trial run at the Union three years ago. Or should the question be directed to a social anthropologist?' With hindsight, it's instructive to note that the reviewer was none other James Merralls, later to serve as Dean of Trinity College, editor of the Commonwealth Law Reports and a distinguished Queen's Counsel as well.

After entertaining Melbourne for four solid months, this 'puerile piece' succeeded in delighting all the other state capitals. The run concluded at Her Majesty's in Sydney on 25 November 1961.

Inevitably, Hollywood called. Columbia filmed Bye Bye Birdie in 1963, with Dick Van Dyke and Paul Lynde from the Broadway production, along with Bobby Rydell, Maureen Stapleton, Ann-Margret, Janet Leigh and Ed Sullivan. It was remade for television in 1996 with Jason Alexander, Tyne Daley and Vanessa Williams. In it, Ms Williams introduced a specially written new song, 'Let's Settle Down', which earned Charles Strouse and Lee Adams an Emmy for Outstanding Music and Lyrics.

After Bye Bye Birdie, Charles Strouse, Lee Adams and Michael



Stewart had distinguished Broadway careers, with only the occasional glitch. Ironically, it was a sequel to Bye Bye Birdie that proved one of their sorriest ventures. Bring Back Birdie starred Chita Rivera and Maria Karnilova and gave Donald O'Connor his Broadway debut. It opened on familiar turf, the Martin Beck, on 5 March 1981 and survived for only four performances. As Broadway guru Ken Mandelbaum put it, 'There is no question that a revival of the original would have been a much better idea.' In truth, Bring Back Birdie had not been intended for Broadway, but rather for the hundreds of school and amateur companies that continually recycled the original.

And so, here we go with a timely revival of that marvellous original. Come on, Put On A Happy Face - We've Got A Lot Of Livin' To Do!

CHARLES STROUSE

Music

and

LEE ADAMS

Lyrics

Charles Strouse was born in 1928 and came to musical theatre from a classical background, having studied at the prestigious Eastman School of Music in Rochester, New York. His early composing included symphonic and chamber music. Early in his career, he also worked as a rehearsal pianist for Broadway shows, which introduced him to the style of music that would bring him such success during his life.

Lee Adams began his career as a journalist, having gained a Masters degree from the renowned Columbia School of Journalism in New York in 1950. He met Strouse at a party in 1949 and continued to work as a journalist for the next 10 years whilst writing songs with Strouse, mainly for nightclub and theatrical revues.

Bye Bye Birdie was the first of Strouse and Adams' many musical theatre collaborations. It won the Tony Award for Musical Play in 1961. Their next show, All American, in 1962, featured a book by the comedian Mel Brooks and starred Ray Bolger. The show was not a great success, running only 80 performances. In 1964, they wrote the score for Golden Boy, starring Sammy Davis Jr., which enjoyed a respectable run of 569 performances. The partnership's next show was It's A Bird. It's A Plane, It's Superman, presented in 1966 and directed by Harold Prince. The show failed to repeat their earlier successes. In 1970, Strouse and Adams teamed up with Betty Comden and Adolph Green, who wrote the book for Applause. This musical, adapted from the 1950 film All About Eve and starring Lauren Bacall, was a major success and earned them another Tony Award for Best Musical Play,

The duo wrote three more scores, including Bring Back Birdle in 1981 but never achieved the success of their earlier collaborations.

In 1977, Strouse joined with Martin Charnin (lyrics) to write Annie. The show was a huge hit (2,377 performances) and received seven Tony Awards including Best Musical and Best Score.

MICHAEL STEWART

Writer

Michael Stewart was born in New York in 1929. He graduated from the Yale School of Drama in 1953 and began his career writing lyrics and sketches for summer revues. Stewart's first major Broadway show was Bye Bye Birdie in 1960. This was followed by Carnival! (words and music by Bob Merrill) and then Hello, Dolly! in 1964 (words and music by Jerry Herman). In 1968, he wrote the book for George M!, celebrating the songs of George M. Cohen.

The remarkable run of successful productions through the 1960s did not last into the 1970s. He teamed up twice more with Jerry Herman, writing the books for *Mack & Mabel* in 1974 and *The Grand Tour* in 1979. Unfortunately, in their original productions, both shows failed to reach the heights that had been achieved with *Hello, Dolly!* but *Mack & Mabel* achieved much greater success in later productions.

In 1977, he wrote the book and lyrics for I Love My Wife, with music by Cy Coleman, which had a respectable run on Broadway of 410 performances. Then in 1980, he had a major success with Barnum, for which he wrote lyrics to Coleman's music. Barnum ran for over two years in New York and had major productions around the world, including Australia. 1980 also saw Stewart contribute to the book of 42nd Street, another major US and international hit. He died in 1987 at the age of 58.





Director and Choreographer

Ross has choreographed professionally since the age of 14, working in every facet of the industry. His first musical was the original Australian production of *Grease*, staged in Melbourne in 1972.

Since then, his musicals include, for the Sydney Theatre Company, I'm Getting My Act Together and Taking It On The Road, Chicago, The Stripper, The Conquest of Carmen Miranda, Summer Rain, Jonah Jones, Company, The Threepenny Opera, Merrily We Roll Along, Miracle City and The Doll's House. For other production companies, Side By Side By Sondheim, The Rocky Horror Show, Jerry's Girls, How To Succeed In Business Without Really Trying, High Society, Cabaret, Grease - The Arena Spectacular and most recently, Shout.

He has choreographed and directed internationally since the age of 18, throughout Asia and more recently, in Europe. From 1994 until 1999, he lived in Berlin, where he worked at the Friedrichstaadtpalast and Metropole Theatre. He choreographed the Russian opera,

The Demon, for the Bregenzer Festspiele in Austria in 1998 and again, at the Zurich Opera House, Switzerland in 1999, the British national tour of High Society, Pomp, Duck and Circumstance in New York, Revue in both Paris and at the St Petersburg Music Hall in Russia.

Other credits include Follies, Love Burns and Trouble In Tahiti for the Melbourne Festival and, for Melbourne Theatre Company, High Society, Company, The Seagull and Great Expectations. Ross has choreographed two shows for The Production Company: Funny Girl in 1999 and Call Me Madam in 2000 and directed The Music Man last year.

For Canterbury Opera in New Zealand, he directed *Turandot* in 2001 and *Norma* in 2002. After two previous nominations, Ross won a Green Room Award in 2001 for his choreography for *Shout!* This year he has nominated for his choreography for *The Music Man*. He directed and choreographed the current on-going national tour of *Shout!*

ANTHONY GABRIELE

Music Director

2003 marks an impressive ten years of Anthony's professional career. Since making his debut as Assistant Music Director on the Australian tour of South Pacific for The Gordon/Frost Organisation, Anthony has also been Assistant Music Director on Blood Brothers and Ken Hill's Phantom of the Opera. As a keyboard player, Anthony has toured Australia with The Pirates of Penzance and Australasia with The Music of Andrew Lloyd Webber with Anthony Warlow and Sarah Brightman. Anthony was Music Supervisor and Vocal Coach for the Australian production of Larry Hart's Sisterella, Assistant Chorus Master and Italian Language Coach on La Bohème (The National Opera of Wellington) and Assistant Conductor and Italian Language Coach on The Barber of Seville for the West Australian Opera Company as part of their Young Artists Development Programme.

Anthony made his on-stage debut as Manny (the accompanist) in the Sydney Theatre Company/Essgee Entertainment production of Master Class. Anthony was the Associate Music Director for The 2002 Helpmann Awards and The Wizard of Oz, and Co-Music Director for the Australian Premiere Concert Production of Dear World for The Australian Opera. Anthony's credits as Music Director include the Australian Premiere production of A Grand Night for Singing, Chess - The Musical (Princess Theatre, Melbourne), CATS (Australian tour under the Big Top), GREASE - The Mega Musical (also under the Big Top) and The 2003 Helpmann Awards. Following this production of Bye Bye Birdie, Anthony will commence as Music Director for the Australian production of The Lion King.



ANDREW HALLSWORTH

Co-Choreographer

Andrew has been involved with The Production Company as a performer on Funny Girl, Call Me Madam, Gypsy and Guys and Dolls. For the last two seasons, he has teamed up with Ross Coleman as co-choreographer on The Music Man, for which they received a Green Room Award nomination, and now, Bye Bye Birdle.

Andrew's theatrical career started when he was 17 on the Australasian tour of 42nd Street. This was followed by the hugely successful national tour of Me and My Girl (Dance Captain), Red Hot and Rhonda, West Side Story and Jolson (Dance Captain). He was Associate Choreographer on the 1998 Australian production of Fiddler on the Roof, starring Topol. For this production, he worked alongside Sammy Dallas Bayes, who is sole re-creator of Jerome Robbin's work on Fiddler.

His long-standing involvement with Shout! The Legend of the Wild One continues. Andrew performed and was Assistant Choreographer to Ross Coleman on the original major cities tour and now, on the regional tour, he is Resident Director/Choreographer. He was also Resident Director on the 2002 production of Oh! What a Night, starring Marcia Hines and Gary Sweet.





RICHARD JEZIORNY

Set and Costume Designer

Richard Jeziorny is a Melbourne based designer whose previous musical credits include The Threepenny Opera, Oliver!, Jesus Christ Superstar, Vincent, Follies and numerous schools' tour projects for OzOpera.

The 2003 production of The Sound Garden is currently touring schools in Victoria.

He has designed for drama, dance and puppetry throughout Australia. Twinkle, Twinkle Little Fish, based on the books of Eric Carle, had a successful season as part of the Sydney Festival and performed to packed houses this year at the New Victory Theatre on Broadway, with further tours planned for South East Asia. Richard also designed nine Urban Dream Capsules throughout the world, providing a practical, vibrant and colourful environment as a living space in department store windows for the four participating actors. The show has been presented in Ghent, London, Montreal, Chicago, Galway, Sao Paulo, Melbourne, Perth and Wellington.

In 2001, he was granted an Asialink residency in Ho Chi Minh City and returned there in 2002 to design, direct and teach, as well as conducting workshops with, the Saigon Water Puppet Troupe.

PAUL JACKSON

Lighting Designer

Paul Jackson's work includes lighting design for Ballet Lab's Self Encasing #1; NYID's Journey into Confusion 3; Melbourne Theatre Company's Frozen and The Recruit; Oz Opera's City of Life; Playbox's Double Bill, This Way Up and Faiboy, Chamber Made Opera's Teorama and The Possessed; Melbourne Workers' Theatre's Who's Afraid of the Working Class and Fever; and set and lighting design for Melbourne Workers' Theatre's Front and Peter Houghton's No Man's Island and Footprints on Water.

In 2000, Paul undertook a work-study in Lighting Design at Banff Festival in Canada with the assistance of the Australia Council. He is Technical Manager of award-winning NYID performance group and was co-designer of their recent show K, which toured to the Vienna Festival in May. He teaches at the University of Melbourne, RMIT University and NMIT in theatre design and associated studies and is completing an MA at the University of Melbourne and an Advanced Diploma of Architectural Lighting at RMIT.





KELVIN GEDYE

Sound Designer for System Sound

Kelvin's theatre career began in 1975 as the resident technician with the Australian Performing Group at the Pram Factory. In 1978, he was a founding member of Circus Oz and toured nationally and internationally as sound designer/operator and occasional performer for almost 10 years. He operated his first musical, Candide, in 1982 and then went on to operate Barnum, Oliver! and Oklahoma! for System Sound during breaks in the Circus Oz schedule.

Since 1987, Kelvin has worked exclusively for System Sound, starting as Sound Operator and Head of Sound on the original Australian tours of Cats, Les Misérables and The Phantom of the Opera, for which he later became Sound Supervisor and then, Associate Sound Designer. Other credits include Supervisor and Assistant Designer for the Australasian tour of West Side Story and Supervisor for the Sydney and Melbourne seasons of Show Boat. Since 2002, Kelvin has been the Associate Sound Designer on a tour of Cats that has played in Beirut, Kuaia Lumpur, Seoul and Shanghai and will open in Taiwan in August. Also in Asia, Kelvin was the Operator for the Hong Kong Handover Ceremony in 1999 and he designed and operated two concerts for the Hong Kong Philharmonic Orchestra in 2001 and 2002. He was also Associate Designer and Operator for the Hong Kong Handover 4th Anniversary concert in July 2001.

Kelvin's sound design for Bye Bye Birdie will be his fourth involvement with The. Production Company, having previously supervised the sound for Mame in 2000 and designed for Mack & Mabel in 2001 and The Music Man in 2002.

DAVID MILLER

Technical Director

Commencing his career as a stage manager with Melbourne Theatre Company in 1979, David spent the next 14 years as a stage manager, tour manager and production manager working for many of the state theatre companies, commercial producers and festivals throughout Australia. Included in this time were productions of The Wizard of Oz, Jerry's Girls, The Rocky Horror Show, Are You Lonesome Tonight?, A Man for All Seasons, Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf, The Hunting of the Snark, several tours with Pam Ayres as well as numerous Melbourne Festivals.

More recently, David worked as the Production Manager for Victoria State Opera and International Management Group on projects including West Side Story, The Puccini Spectacular, My Fair Lady, two tours with Shirley Bassey, the Werribee Park Festival, Dame Kiri Te Kanawa and the Australian and Asian tours of the award winning Chicago. David now runs his own production company, David's Company, specialising in theatre and concert management. Projects have included Buddy - The Musical, Always ... Patsy Cline, Oh, What a Night!, Spirit of the Dance and The Man From Snowy River as well as being Technical Director for all of The Production Company seasons including the recent tour of Hair.





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
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
