DEBRA BYRNE

Belle Schlumpfert

Anyone who has ever heard Debra Byrne sing knows just how special this Australian performer is. Debra has amassed credentials in music, television, film and on stage that few can match.

Whether it be as the 16 year old Queen of Pop, to the heart-breaking thrill of Grizabella's Memory in Cats, her career has been full of memorable highlights.

Debra first won Australian Heats as the "little girl with the big voice" on the original Young Talent Time, where she performed for four years. Following this, she moved to a recording career and won the Australian Queen of Pop Award for two consecutive years.

With two Logie Awards to her credit, Debra's television career took her to London and appearances on the Cliff Richard's BBC-TV series, her own ABC-TV series with John Farnham, titled Farnham and Byrne and her first acting role in the Sammy Award winning TV Follies.

Debra starred with Matt Dillon in Rebel where she dazzled cinema-goers with her performance and was nominated for an Australian Film Institute Award.

The next eight years saw Debra build her reputation as one of Australia's leading theatre ladies. She achieved critical acclaim as Grizabella in Cats, performed with Judi Connelli in Jerry's Girls, and played the role of Fantine in Les Misérables. Her voice is featured in the Grammy award winning symphonic recording of Les Misérables. In 1988 she performed for the Prince and Princess of Wales at the Royal Bicentennial Concert.

Debra released her first album in 1991 called

Caught in the Act, which proved a huge success by reaching number one on the Australian Charts. After the success of Caught in the Act, Debra wrote and recorded her second album Sleeping Child.

After nearly two years of waiting, she won the much-coveted role as Norma Desmond in Sunset Boulevard and on the 26th of October 1996 she gave the performance of her life.

Debra recorded her third album New Ways to Dream, her favourite.

Debra has become increasingly recognised for her dramatic talent, appearing in guest roles in the top rating TV dramas, GP, Police Rescue, Law of the Land, the ABC series Naked and more recently The Secret Life of Us.

In 1999 Debra returned to cabaret with her show Caught in the Act Again!! She is currently performing in her own creation starring with Wendy Stapleton and Nikki Nicholls in Girls Girls Girls!!!

In 2004, Debra appeared in the box office smash Minefields and Miniskirts for the Malthouse Theatre, which toured nationally in 2005.

Debra is the very proud mother of Arja Byrne 28, Lauren Byrne 25, and Lucille Le Meledo 7. Debra is also the very proud and totally unbiased grandmother of Oliver 2 and Aaron Byrne 9 months.

In December 2005, Debra chaperoned Lucille's debut performance on the nationally televised Carols by Candlelight on Channel 9.

In March 2006 Debra released her latest album With All My Heart. In November 2006 Debra released through Pan Macmillan her autobiography Not Quite Ripe.

In October of this year, Debra will reprise her role of Grizabella for a production of Cats at the Derwent Entertainment Centre in Hobart, Tasmania.

Debra performed in Thoroughly Modern Millie in 2006 for The Production Company and is delighted to be returning for Little Me. Mitchell is one of Australia's most versatile and respected stage and screen actors. He has previously performed for The Production Company as Ali Hakim in Oklahoma! for which he received a 2006 Green Room nomination for Best Featured Actor in a Musical and as Woof in the initial season and subsequent tour of Hair for which he received the 2002 Green Room Award in the same category and a Mo Award nomination. Mitchell's other theatre credits include Tomfoolery, Urinetown, Piaf (MTC), Summer Rain, Harbour, The Republic of Myopia, Holy Day, Mourning Becomes Electra, Tartuffe, Two Weeks with the Queen, Dead White Males, The Café Latte Kid, Summer of the Aliens, Six Degrees of Separation (STC), The Venetian Twins (QTC), The Adventures of Snugglepot and Cuddlepie, The Laramie Project, A View from the Bridge, Dead Heart (Company B Belvoir), Othello (Bell Shakespeare Company) Unidentified Human Remains and The True Nature of Love (STCSA), Laughter on the 23rd Floor (Ensemble), A Hard God (New England Theatre Co), The Fantasticks (Newtown Actors Group), Blue Remembered Hills (O'Punksky's Theatre Co), Mad, Bad and Spooky (Theatre of Image/Syd Fest), Grease, Man of La Mancha (Gordon Frost/SEL), Little Shop of Horrors (David Atkins Enterprises), Saturday Night Fever (DAE/ICA), Follies and Bernadette Peters in Concert (Sydney Opera House) and last year was seen as Rodney in Dusty - The Original Pop Diva (Dusty

Mitchell has written and performed in two solo cabaret shows, Mitchell Butel's Excellent Adventure and And Now For The Weather and is the voice of the Playschool Theme Song. On television, he has appeared in Stephen King's Nightmares and Dreamscapes, MDA, Grass Roots, In the Swim, All Saints, Wildside, Murder Call, Close Ups, Twisted Tales, Bordertown and GP. His film credits include Gettin' Square, The Bank, Strange Fits of Passion, Virtual Nightmare, Two Hands and Dark City.

Mitchell received 2006 and 2004 Helpmann Award nominations for Best Supporting Actor in a Musical for Summer Rain and The Republic of Myopia, the 2005 Helpmann Award for Best Actor in a Musical for The Venetian Twins, a 2005 Mo Award nomination for The Republic of Myopia, the 2000 Green Room Award for Best Featured Actor in a Musical for Piaf and 1999 and 2003 AFI nominations for Best Supporting Actor in a Feature Film for Strange Fits of Passion and Gettin' Square.

He will next be seen opposite Magda Szubanski in the Melbourne Theatre Company production of The Madwoman of Chaillot.

Heather's recent theatre productions include the premieres of 3 Cities for Ranters Theatre in Cardiff, Wales and The George Fairfax Award Winner Taize by Teresa Bell for Castlemaine Festival; David Mamet's Boston Marriage for Downstage Theatre; and Ariette Taylor's production of Chekhov's Ivanov.

A member of Melbourne's Ranters Theatre, Heather has performed in the company's Roulette plays, St Kilda Tales, and The Wall touring Europe and Australia. Other theatre includes MTC's Assassins and Into the Woods; Playbox Theatre's Ruby Moon, Blak Inside, Salt, Miracles, Speaking in Tongues and Eleventh Hour's Brecht, Beckett, Kane. She has appeared in TV series Blue Heelers, MDA and Stingers. Films include Angel Baby, Fred Schepisi's Evil Angels, Gaylene Preston's Mr Wrong for which she won a GOFTA Best Actress award and the current MIFF feature The Tragedy of Hamlet, Prince of Denmark.

Daniel has a long list of theatre and musical theatre credits to his name, including The 25th Annual Putnam County Spelling Bee for The Sydney Theatre Company, Twelfth Night for Essential Theatre, We Will Rock You (Australia and Japan tour), Romeo & Juliet, and Macbeth, both for Complete Works Theatre Company and Fame The Musical (Australia and Asia tours).

Daniel is also a part of the Green Room Award winning cabaret show Vaudeville X that played successful seasons at both the Melbourne International Comedy Festival and most recently the Adelaide Cabaret Festival.

Daniel has been involved in a number of film projects, the most recent *Inanimate Objects* for Adonis Films in which he played the Lead (yet to be released).

As a TV Actor his credits include Neighbours, Thunderstone II and Blue Heelers, and as a singer he has performed on several variety shows as well as Carols in the Domain.

Daniel has been involved with the workshopping of new Australian theatre and film. He was part of the original workshop for Priscilla The Musical.

Amongst his extensive studies he was recently invited to study acting at The Atlantic Theater Acting School in New York.

Joanna hails from Perth where she completed her Bachelor of Arts in Musical Theatre at WAAPA. Credits there included Working, My Favourite Year and Lysistrata. She performed regularly in a vocal trio around Perth with the likes of David Campbell and Todd McKenney.

Her first major contract was as a cabaret singer on the Superstar Gemini Cruise, Singapore. Since arriving in Melbourne three years ago she has worked for The Entertainment Store hosting children's shows, No Mates Productions, Theatre in Decay at the Adelaide Fringe Festival and appeared in Anthony Crowley's The Wild Blue.

Ensemble Four is one of her ongoing projects, a group of four actor/directors producing new Australian works and who will be launching with a full length play this year.

Last year was Joanna's The Production Company debut in Thoroughly Modern Millie. She is delighted to be part of the team who are again bringing a new musical to the Australian stage.



PETER LOWREY Benny Buchsbaum

Peter began his career with the Royal Queensland Theatre Company's production of Gypsy and since then has worked extensively as an actor, singer and dancer.

His credits include the national tour of Best Little Whorehouse in Texas and the original productions of Evita and Me and My Girl. Peter performed Coricopat in Cats and during his association with that show also performed the roles of Alonzo and the RumTumTugger. A change of style followed with the Q Theatre's production of The Sentimental Bloke, followed by the national tour of My Fair Lady. In 1989 Peter appeared in Cole Porter's Anything Goes, after which he toured Australia and New Zealand with Les Misérables. In 1992 Peter performed the role of Ed in Torch Song Trilogy, he then performed in South Pacific for Gordon/Frost in Thailand, returning to Australia to perform in The Secret Garden. In 1996 Peter once again performed in My Fair Lady in Brisbane and was the Artistic Director for the One

Night Stand concert for the Victorian AIDS Council. In 1997 Peter returned to IMG's production of My Fair Lady as associate choreographer. Also in 1997 he played the role of Peter in Crazy For You in the Australian tour. In 1999 Peter was assistant choreographer in the Essgee production of Merry Widow. From 2001 - 2002 Peter played Fr Alex and understudied Sam and Harry in the fabulous Mamma Mial. He is a sort after marriage celebrant in his "other" job. Peter appeared in Sunset Boulevard as Manfred, after also appearing in the highly acclaimed Kiss Me, Kate again for The Production Company. Peter has recently joined the corporate entertaining group The Rat Pack's Back.




ADAM MURPHY Bernie Buchsbaum

Adam has lived a large portion of his life in New Zealand but now calls Melbourne home. He studied Drama and Film Studies at the University of South Australia and trained at the Bay of Plenty Academy of Performing Arts (NZ).



Patrick Dennis's comic biographies Mame, Little Me and First Lady tell the stories of three lovable, larger-than-life ladies: Mame Dennis, Belle Poitrine and Martha Dinwiddle Butterfield. Though the first was very loosely based on an eccentric relative of the author's, there was, of course, never a real Auntie Mame, a real Belle or a real Martha – or, for that matter, a real Patrick Dennis.

In fact, Mr Dennis was as much a fabulous fiction as the 'real live girls' that he created, and his life was every bit as bizarre as theirs. In reality, Patrick Dennis was Edward Everett Tanner III. Born in Evanstown, Illinois in 1921, he drove ambulances in North Africa and Saudi Arabia during the war and, in 1948, married and fathered two children. In the early 1950s he published two novels, Oh What a Wonderful Wedding and House Party, using the pseudonym Virginia Rowans. It was for Auntie Mame: An Irreverent Escapade, in 1955, that he adopted the name Patrick Dennis – and achieved fame and fortune.

Auntie Mame spent 112 weeks on the best seller list and eventually sold over two million copies in five languages. Rosalind Russell



In the end it was the brilliant Neil Simon who crafted the adaptation. The songs were written by Cy Coleman and Carolyn Leigh; they had made an auspicious Broadway debut with Wildcat in 1960. Bob Fosse, who'd worked with Feuer and Martin on How to Succeed..., came on board as choreographer, and he and Feuer co-directed. As the crusty Broadway critic Frank Rich reminisced: 'For one all-too-brief moment, a sassy group of young Broadway talents came into glittering conjunction.'

Dorothy Provine, Julie London, Edie Adams, Janis Paige and even Joan Collins were considered for the role of Belle, but eventually the part went to one of the stars of How to Succeed..., Virginia Martin. It was Simon The unreality of a musical freed him. And Little Me is a wonderful example of a comic musical, possibly the funniest made until its time.'

The show began its tryout tour in Philadelphia on 8 October 1962. Though the reviews were enthusiastic, the creative team cut and polished ruthlessly. Two songs, 'Mama's Little Girl' and 'Lafayette' were jettisoned, and some characters were written out. 'Sure we're tough.' Feuer told a reporter, 'but in this business, nice guys finish in Philadelphia.'

Little Me reached New York's Lunt-Fontanne
Theatre on 17 November 1962. In the Herald'
Tribune, Walter Kerr called it, 'A happy
holiday of a show ... a blockbuster so genial
it looks like a breeze.' The New York Times'
Howard Taubman agreed: 'It gleams with
show biz savvy.' And the song 'Real Live Girl'
swiftly became a real live hit.

Little Me was nominated for nine Tony Awards, but in a year dominated by A Funny Thing Happened on the Way to the Forum and Oliver! it won only one – for Bob Fosse's

who came up with the idea of making the show a star vehicle for the seven men in Belle's life - all to be portrayed by one man. And the man they chose was Sid Caesar, the guick-witted comedian for whom Simon had toiled as a scriptwriter on TV's Your Show of Shows. Caesar had appeared on Broadway only once before, in 1948, but his television clowning had made him famous. Caesar and Simon worked closely on the Little Me's comedic elements. As music theatre guru Martin Gottfried put it: With Little Me, Simon found an exuberance and a comic lunacy that he did not often display, even in his most successful comedies.

choreography. After notching up a respectable 257 Broadway performances, it toured the United States for many months.

Almost exactly two years after its Broadway debut, Little Me opened at the Cambridge Theatre in London. This time Eileen Gourlay was the young Belle, while variety veteran Bruce Forsyth played the seven gentlemen in her life. Forsyth, who'd started his show biz career as 'Boy Bruce – The Mighty Atom', was familiar as the genial host of TV's Sunday Night at the London Palladium, but this was his first 'book' show. Little Me ran for 334 performances in the West End.

Over the years Little Me has earned a devoted cult following and has been revived several times. Neil Simon revised the book when the show played at New York's Eugene O'Neill Theatre in 1982, and two of the original songs were replaced; more importantly - and less successfully - the Caesar-Forsythe roles were split between James Coco and Victor Garber, In his New York Times review, Frank Rich called it 'a spotty, sloppy substitute' for the 'zestier and grander' 1962 original. It survived for only 36 performances. A 1984 presentation at the Prince of Wales in London was similarly lacklustre. In the Roundabout Theatre Company presentation in New York in 1998, Belle was played by Faith Prince, who delighted cabaret audiences in Australia last year. Martin Short played all her beaux; his efforts were rewarded with the Tony for Best Actor in a Musical.

What about Australia? Up till now, there's been only one fully professional production of Little Me in this country. Perhaps because of the casting challenges it presented, the show seems to have been studiously ignored by major local producers such as J.C. Williamson Ltd. It finally arrived, albeit in somewhat scaled down form, at Menzies Hotel Theatre Restaurant in Sydney in 1968. Fresh from her triumphs in Sweet Charity, Nancye Hayes sparkled as the younger Belle, while debonair Tivoli revue favourite Colin Croft played her suitors. Others in the cast included Laurel Veitch, Henri Szeps, Sue Walker and ex-Kiwi comedian Phil Jay. Tivoli stalwart Sheila Cruze choreographed. Enzo Toppano conducted the orchestra, and Jon Ewing directed.

Since then we've had to be content with several amateur productions. The most notable, in 1983, was presented by Festival Theatre Company at the National Theatre in St Kilda. This featured Maggie Kirkpatrick – then best known as Joan 'The Freak' Ferguson in the TV series *Prisoner* – as Belle; Rex Callahan directed.

And what of the man who started it all

- Edward Everett 'call me Patrick Dennis'

Tanner III? Well, that's another story, and an extraordinary one. The various permutations of Auntie Mame made him a fortune, which he proceeded to enjoy to the full. He was tall, good looking, had twinkling blue eyes and sported a fashionable beard. He was devastatingly witty, dressed stylishly and became the darling of New York society.

But ... in the middle of all the glamour and clamour he discovered that he was gay. This, plus the stresses of success, led to a drinking problem. Eventually he fell in love with a man, but it took an extended stay in a sanatorium for him to realise that he would have to leave his marriage.

By the early 1970s his writing had fallen out of fashion, and he began to self-destruct. According to an acquaintance, 'He was always ending up naked in fountains.' Finally he pulled himself together and got himself a job. To his friends' astonishment he became a butler. Not just any butler, mind you: he worked for Ray Kroc, the founder of McDonald's.

By then he had dropped his pseudonym, but his employer had no idea that his impeccable manservant Tanner was the world-famous author Patrick Dennis.

Edward Everett Tanner III died of pancreatic cancer in 1976. He was 55. In recent years there has been renewed interest in the life and work of the surprising Mr Tanner. His books have been republished, several with affectionate introductions by his son, Dr Michael Tanner, and, of course, great shows like Mame and Little Me continue to delight new generations of theatregoers.

So here's a toast to Edward Tanner – and to his greatest creations, Patrick Dennis, Auntie Mame and Belle Poitrine. And, ladies and gentlemen, as Belle sings as she brings down the curtain on Little Me – 'Here's to Us'.


Nicholas is thrilled to again be working with The Production Company and such a wonderful cast in Little Me.



JULIAN SPINK Sound Designer



Paul works for Melbourne based firm The Flaming Beacon as a theatre, architectural and events lighting designer.


His design work for performance includes lighting designs for The Production Company, The Australian Ballet, Royal New Zealand Ballet, Melbourne Theatre Company, West
