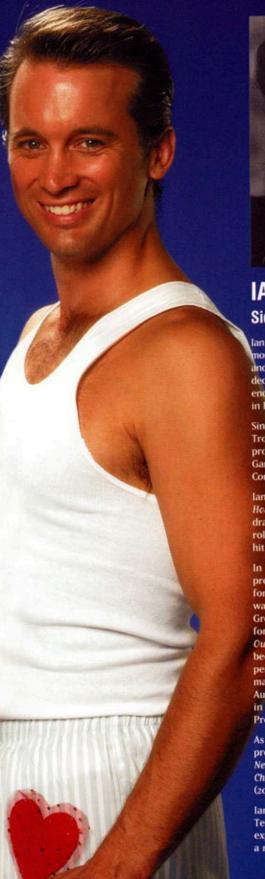

IAN STENLAKE

Sid Sorokin

lan Stenlake has developed a reputation as one of Australia's most diverse actors, working consistently in film, television and theatre since graduating from NIDA in 1996. lan's decision to pursue a career in acting came after a chance encounter with several actors in Rome led to him appearing in Francis Ford Coppola's film The Godhather Part 3.

Since then Ian has toured with Grin & Tonic Theatre Troupe performing Shakespeare, appeared in EHJ's production of *Romeo and Juliet* in Sydney's Botanic Gardens and performed with the Royal Shakespeare Company in a one-off vaudeville production of *Music Hall*.

lan's television credits include the ABC-TV series Children's Hospital, Murder Call and most recently the Nine Network drama series Stingers in which he played the popular lead role of Constable Oscar Stone. He has also appeared in the hit English film The Dingles Down Under.

In 2003 Ian completed a national tour of IMG's musical production of Cabaret, in the role of Clifford Bradshaw, for which he was nominated for a Green Room Award. It was the following year, however, that saw him win the Green Room Award for Best Male Artist in a Leading Role for his performance as Vernon Gersch in They're Playing Our Song for The Production Company. Ian has further been nominated for this important Award: for his performance as Peter Lalor in the musical Eureka (2005), marking the 150th anniversary of the Eureka Stockade in Australia; and then this year winning the Best Male Artist in a Leading Role Award for his portrayal of Curly in The Production Company's Oklahoma!

As well as his winning performances in these productions, Ian has recently appeared in Songs for a New World at the Adelaide Cabaret Festival (2004), Charters Towers — The Musical for the QLD Music Festival (2004) and Walkabout for Chamber Made Opera (2005).

lan has been a regular guest vocalist on Network Ten Television's Good Morning Australia, has extensive experience headlining corporate events, and is currently a member of the performance group Bravo.



PIPPA GRANDISON

Babe Williams

Hailing from Perth, Pippa was lured by the bright lights of Sydney at just eighteen, where she immediately landed the lead role of Anne in Sondheim's A Little Night Music for the Sydney Theatre Company. Also for the STC, Pippa played Cinderella in Into The Woods and several roles in the late Nick Enright's Blackrock: she then went on to play the title role in the premiere of his musical, Mary Bryant, at the Ensemble Theatre.

Since then Pippa has worked extensively in theatre, television and film. On stage she has been seen in Tragedy. The Misanthrope and Savage in Limbo for Hair of The Dog Theatre Co (of which Pip is a founding member); The Threepenny Opera for Company B; The Witches of Eastwick for Jacobsen's; the Arena version of Happy Days and was involved in celebrity readings of The Vagina Monologues. More recently Pippa appeared in Babies Proms at the Sydney Opera House.

Pippa has appeared on television in Australia and the USA on Crash Palace, South Pacific, The Three Stooges, All Saints, Big Sky, Twisted Tales and & Street. She also worked on numerous ABC mini series including Come In Spinner, Golden Fiddles and The Brides of Christ.

On film Pippa has been seen in Two Door Mansion (to be released), Mr Accident, Two Girls and a Baby, Hotel de Love, Dating the Enemy, Muriel's Wedding and Over The Hill.

Pippa's band, Ladykiller, recently released their first EP, Boys Are Contagious.



RACHAEL BECK

Gladys

Award-winning actor Rachael Beck is one of Australia's most in-demand performers in musical theatre and television.

Much of Rachael's current time is dedicated to musical theatre, including her most recent role of Peg Hartigan in the 2005 Sydney Theatre Company production of Summer Rain, directed by Robyn Nevin.

Rachael is widely remembered for her award winning role opposite Hugh Jackman as Belle in *Beauty and the Beast*, which won an ARIA Award for the Best Australian Soundtrack / Cast / Show Release in 1996.

Over recent years, Rachael has also worked consistently in Australia's most popular theatre productions, including Eureka directed by Gale Edwards for Essgee Entertainment, and in the role of Sally Bowles in the IMG production of Cabaret, directed by Sam Mendes. Also for IMG, she played Kathy Selden in the hit Singin' in the Rain directed by David Atkins, which earned her a prestigious Mo Award nomination, and the role of Maria in the Gordon/Frost Organization/SEL production of The Sound of Music. Previously, Rachael created the roles of Princess Maria in The Production Company's Call Me Madam, and Donna, Chanelette and Amy in Big Hair in America, which premiered at the Hot House Theatre under the direction of Marion Potts.

Rachael's other stage credits include her Green Award nominated performance as Fantine in the Cameron Macintosh production of Les Miserables, Rumpleteaser in Cats, also for Cameron Macintosh, the role of Naomi in the Playbox and STC production of Secret Bridesmaid's Business and as Sally in Me and My Girl which toured Australia and New Zealand for the Adelaide Festival.

She has also appeared in two productions with the Sydney Theatre Company, as Fredrika in A Little Night Music and Lady Mortimer in Henry IV.

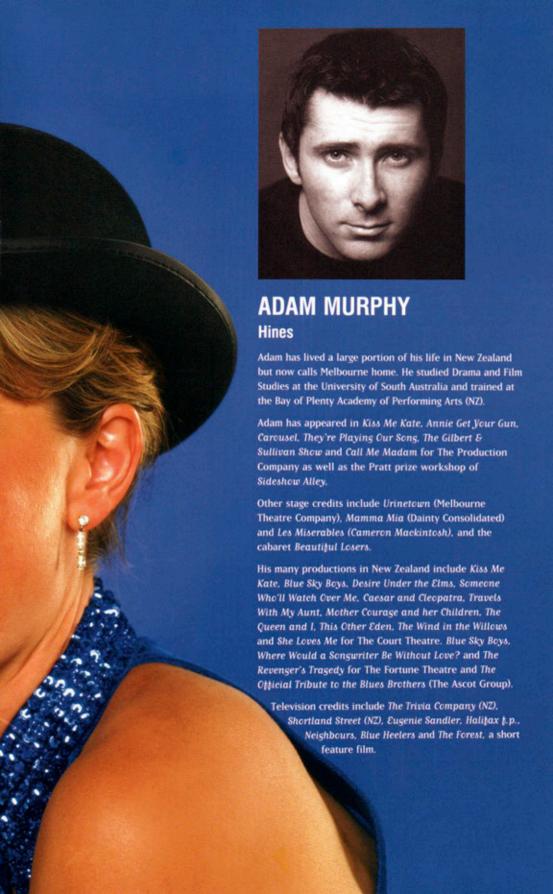
In 1992, Rachael performed the role of Judy Garland in her own one-woman show, Young Judy, written by John Beck.

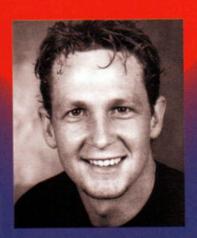

Prez

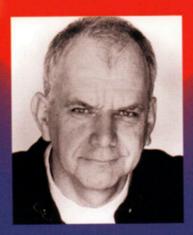
David has most recently appeared onstage as Perchik in Fiddler On The Root, alongside Topol.

This is Peter's second production with The Production Company, his first being Oklahoma! It is the fourth with director Terence O'Connell, having performed in the Australian/New Zealand tour of Buddy - the Buddy Holly Story, and Glynn Nicholas' hugely successful show, Certified Male. Having worked in theatre, film, television, and radio for almost 30 years, Peter has developed a good head for radio, leading to a career predominantly in voiceovers, book narration (over 100 titles), and more recently, revoicing Hong Kong action movies.

Peter has performed the one man play A Stretch of the Imagination in Sydney, Melbourne and Adelaide to great acclaim (read reviews at www.hosking.net) and has been producing (sometimes hosting) the music show Nu Country TV for Channel 31 for the last two years. His most recent television appearance was on Last Man Standing.



JULIE O'REILLY

Mabel

Julie studied at Deakin University, gaining a Bachelor of Contemporary Arts (majoring in Drama & Dance), at the National Theatre Drama School in its Graduate of the Music Theatre course, and has studied singing privately over the past 10 years.

Julie's most recent theatrical work was in the national tour of Mel Brooks' musical The Producers, which won her a Green Room Award for Best Ensemble Member in a Featured Role. Other theatre credits include Jan in Grease — The Mega Musical (national tour), Jennyanydots — The Gumbie Cat in Cats (national tour), the ensemble in Hello Dolly for The Production Company, a mama in Fiddler on the Root starring Topol, Shirl in Dimboola, and ensemble for Red Hot and Rhonda in the opening of the Crown Casino, Melbourne. Julie was honored to perform at the launch of Peter Cousen's Kookaburra.

Directorial credits include Bash in the 2003
Melbourne Fringe Festival (with a return season at the Store Room), which gained her a nomination for a Fringe Award and special mention in the Performance category. Short film and television credits include Debbie in The Secret Life of Us. Merle in That Was Close (Colin Budd's 2005
Tropfest entry) and various humorous television commercials. Julie is looking forward to playing the role of Eleanor Widener in the upcoming production of Titanic — A New Musical in the Theatre Royal in Sydney later this year.





DIRECTOR'S NOTES

The Pajama Game is a very special show for me as the original Broadway production was directed by one of my great theatrical heroes, George Abbott, and choreographed by another of my idols, Bob Fosse, who put his unmistakable stamp on Steam Heat, while Richard Adler and Jerry Ross wrote their unforgettable score, jam packed with great songs, for these masters of the musical to stage.

The Pajama Game was innovative in many ways, not least in its setting in Cedar Rapids, Iowa, when most musicals played out their scenarios in more exotic locations. The factory girls and secretaries are never merely 'decorative objects', as was the case in much popular entertainment of the period. They have minds and spines of their own, which levels the erotic playing field that is the base of the show. After the song Small Talk, Babe cooks a midnight snack for Sid, and takes off her best dress, so as not to spatter it with grease! She's left only wearing a slip and in that moment, audiences saw for the first time in a musical that two unmarried characters were going to spend the night together. With the factory workers striking for their seven and a half cents raise, the show is not without its contemporary connotations. Can management and labour work and love together despite their differences?

It's terrific to be working again with my favourite musical 'leading man', Ian Stenlake as Sid Sorokin, after directing his award winning performances as Vernon Gersch in They're Playing Our Song and Curly McLain in Oklahoma! I've been fortunate to be able to surround him with the luminous talents of Pippa Grandison, Rachael Beck, Adam Murphy and David Harris and our wonderful 'character' actors Peter Hosking and Julie O'Reilly. It would be remiss of me not to mention the very 'heart' of our show, the superb all singing, dancing, acting ensemble, twenty of our brightest young theatre artists.

As always with The Production Company's Broadway Classics, I am lucky to work with a great production team led by the masterful Peter Casey as Musical Director and Conductor, the ever inventive designer, Richard Jeziorny, lighting maestro, Philip Lethlean, who makes all our work look good and especially my long time collaborator, choreographer Alana Scanlan.

Perhaps Sid's behaviour on the factory floor might be mistaken for harassment in 2006, and unquestioned respect for unions and the idea of wearing pajamas every night could date it a little, but more than fifty years after its debut, *The Pajama Game* is still as bright and shiny as a brand new pin. I hope you enjoy the fun at the Sleep-Tite Pajama Factory as much as we have creating it for you.

FRANK VAN STRATEN Discovers how love across the picket lines became a big Broadway hit

A musical about a union dispute? In the United States in 1954 it was certainly an unlikely premise — though, only the year before, Australians had welcomed New Theatre's Reedy River, a musical built around the 1891 Queensland shearers' strike.

The Pajama Game had its genesis in a novel, 7 1/2 Cents, which author Richard Bissell based on his experiences in his family's pajama factory in Dubuque, Iowa. Broadway producers Hal Prince and Richard Griffiths saw the story's musical possibilities and snapped up the rights, but persuading people to work on the project proved far more difficult.

Legendary Broadway director George Abbott was sceptical — until he conceived the idea of a subplot built around Hines' jealousy. Bissell agreed to work with him on the book, and Frank Loesser's protégés, Richard Adler and Jerry Ross, came on board to write the score — their first Broadway 'book' musical. The producers took other chances. They gave a brilliant young dancer, Bob Fosse, his first choreographic commission, and an equally brilliant young choreographer, Jerome Robbins, his first chance to direct.

Their casting was also adventurous. To play Sid they selected John Raitt (Bonnie's father); he'd suffered a series of flops after Carousel in 1945. The two leading ladies, Janis Paige (Babe) and Carol Haney (Gladys), had never appeared on Broadway, and ex-vaudevillian Eddie Foy Jr (Hines) hadn't been in a major new Broadway show for 20 years.

Understandably, with 'credits' like these, finding backers for the show was difficult. Eventually several members of the company chipped in, including Abbott himself, who contributed \$28,000.

The show's various elements came together remarkably smoothly, and only one number, 'The World Around Us,' was chopped.

Though the New Haven tryout was a triumph, the New York 'advance' was so poor it looked as if the show was doomed. The opening at the St James on 13 May 1954 changed all that. The audience cheered and the critics raved: 'Broadway looks well in pajamas — a bright, brassy and jubilantly sassy show,' said The Herald Tribune; The Journal American agreed: 'The best book show since Guys and Dolls'. Jean-Luc Godard called it 'The first leftwing operetta'. The box office exploded.

The Pajama Game notched up 1063 performances on Broadway, while the road company trundled around the country for two solid years. The show garnered three Tony Awards — Best Musical, Best Choreography and, for Carol Haney, Best Featured Actress. It also launched more than its fair share of careers, including Shirley MacLaine, who understudied Haney. Sadly, though, the collaboration of Adler and Ross was short lived. After their second major hit, Damn Jankees in 1955, Jerry Ross died of a long-standing lung condition. He was 29. Adler's musical future lay in TV jingles.





Warner Bros' paid \$750,000 for the movie rights. Broadway star Janis Paige was bypassed for the more bankable charms of Doris Day — though she was in fact second choice; the producers had wanted the beautiful blonde pop star Patti Page. Frank Sinatra, Marlon Brando, Dean Martin and Gordon MacRae were all considered for the part of Sid, but ultimately John Raitt was contracted to repeat his Broadway role, along with Carol Haney and Eddie Foy. George Abbott co-produced and codirected the film with Stanley Donen, who had danced in Abbott musicals in the 1940s. Bob Fosse expanded his innovative original choreography, filling the wide screen with breathtakingly complex ensemble work.

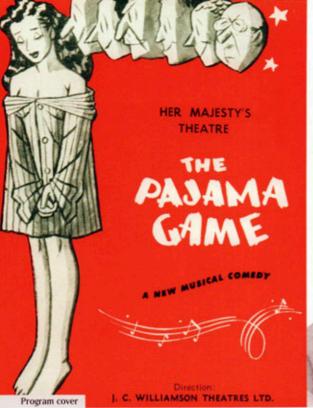
The result was an unusually accurate adaptation of the Broadway original, though the songs 'Her Is', 'A New Town Is a Blue Town' and 'Think of the Time I Save' were dropped, as was a new song, 'The Man Who Intended Love', which Adler had written specially for Doris Day.

Before the movie, however, The Pajama Game had crossed the Atlantic. The London production opened at the Coliseum on 13 October 1955 with a cast headed by Edmund Hockridge (Sid), Joy Nichols (Babe), Max Wall (Hines) and Elizabeth Seal (Gladys). Joy Nichols, an Australian, had cut her professional teeth at the Tivoli and had achieved enormous popularity on radio both here (in The

Youth Show) and in Britain (in Take It From Here).

And there were other Australian connections:
minor roles were filled by Terry Donovan, Myra de
Groot and Patricia Vivian-Lall. The Pajama Game
scored a 588-performance run in the West End.

Towards the end of 1955 JC Williamson's announced that it had secured the Australian rights to The Pajama Game. As usual there was excited speculation about who the stars would be, 'but,' predicted The Argus on 25 February 1956, 'they will certainly come from either London or New York.' To the astonishment of the entire Australian theatre establishment, the predictions were wrong. For the first time for many years. Williamson's cast a major musical entirely from fresh, young, local talent: Bill Newman (Sid), Toni Lamond (Babe), Keith Peterson (Hines), Tikki Taylor (Gladys) and Jill Perryman (Mabel). The company also included Alton Harvey, Robert Healey, Kevan Johnston, John Newman, Reginald Newson, Patricia Raye, Don Richard, John Sanger, Ron Shand, Frank Sheldon and Ralphine Sprague. The only American in the company was Jack Little, cast as Hasler. Jack had been a 3DB radio personality since 1952, and had played the father in Garnet H Carroll's 1956 production of Tea and Sympathy. He was also pretty good as a wrestling commentator.





In The Argus of 1 December 1956, Williamson's production manager, Terry Vaughan, tried to explain why the show would have no imported 'stars': 'Tests have proved that Miss Lamond and Mr Newman are ideally suited to the roles,' he said. 'Why look any further and take a certain amount of risk with artists of unknown ability from America or London?' Why, indeed? — but what about all the Australian talent that Williamson's had ignored in the past and, sadly, would continue to overlook in the future?

The only import concession was the director, Fred Hebert. He'd been one of the Broadway production's two stage managers. Williamson's entrusted the job of recreating Bob Fosse's signature choreography to their young resident ballet mistress, Betty Pounder. She spent five weeks in New York watching the show night after night, noting, in her own way, the complicated dance moves.

Australia's Pajama Game was launched at Her Majesty's in Melbourne on 2 February 1957. For the gala first night the ushers gamely wore colourful night attire but, noted the press reprovingly, the audience was not as glamorously caparisoned as usual. Nevertheless, the night went with a bang. The Age liked the 'immense enthusiasm and energy' and The Herald called it 'gay, lively and top-notch,' but The Sun was struck dumb: 'What can you say about a smash hit, except that it is?' The Listener In hit the mark: 'For the first time in theatrical history the JCW

management has taken the bit in its teeth and given us an American musical with an all-Australian cast. And its courage has been signally rewarded.'

The Pajama Game was the first major musical staged in this country after the arrival of television, and when GTV Channel 9 commenced transmission on 18 January 1957, Toni Lamond, Frank Sheldon and other members of the company were featured in the opening show. The Pajama Game played more than five months in Melbourne, including a return season. As well as visiting all mainland capitals, there was a gruelling 10-city tour of New Zealand, including one- and two-night stands in Masterton, Wanganui, Timaru and Oamaru. In Auckland members of the company found time to record a 7" EP disc of the show's highlights. It was released only in New Zealand, and is now a highly prized collector's item. The show's 'Steam Heat' finally evaporated on 27 July 1958, when the marathon run ended at the Theatre Royal, Adelaide.

'All our names were made in that show,' reminisced Toni Lamond. When the run was extended Frank [Sheldon] and I made a down payment on a block of land.' Their little son, Tony, had travelled with them. By the time the tour finished he was two and a half years old, and knew every song in the show.



While The Pajama Game was barnstorming New Zealand, back on Broadway a new musical called, Say, Darling, had its premiere - but could easily have been called Son of Pajama Game! Just as Richard Bissell had mined his own experiences to create the book 7 1/2 Cents and the musical The Pajama Game, so he used his Pajama Game adventure as the subject of another book Say, Darling, and this, in turn, became a musical. Bissell collaborated with his wife, Marian, and Abe Burrows on the book, Betty Comden and Adolph Green wrote the lyrics and Jules Styne supplied the music. The cast included Vivian Blaine. David Wayne, Robert Morse, and a very young Elliott Gould. Say, Darling notched up a respectable 332 performances, but has failed to achieve the enduring popularity of the show that inspired it.

In 1973 Adler produced an inter-racial Broadway revival of *The Pajama Game*. Cab Calloway played Hines and there was a brand new song, 'Watch Your Heart', but the show disappeared after only 55 lacklustre performances. A 1989 City Opera revival met a similar fate, and a clumsily updated Birmingham Rep production by Simon Callow had a short, bumpy run when it played at the Victoria Palace Theatre in London in 1999.

But earlier this year *The Pajama Game* bounced back on Broadway, bigger, brighter and better than ever. There were three new songs: The Three of Us,' which Richard Adler had written for Jimmy Durante back in 1964, 'The World Around Us,' which had been cut in 1954, and 'If You Win, You Lose', a re-working of the 1973 revival's 'Watch Your Heart'. Harry Connick Jr was a stand-out as Sid and the cast featured Roz Ryan as Mabel — she was Bloody Mary in the 1993-94 Gordon/Frost Australian production of South Pacific. It garnered the Tony for Best Revival of a Musical.

Not bad for a fifty-year-old left-wing operetta! Figure that out!

THE WRITERS, COMPOSERS AND LYRICISTS

GEORGE ABBOTT

Book

George Abbott was an actor, writer, producer, director and noted "show doctor" who first appeared on Broadway in 1913. He wrote or co-wrote the books for plays such as The Pajama Game. Damn Yankees, The Boys From Syracuse, Where's Charley?, New Girl in Town, Three Men on a Horse, On Your Toes. Fiorello!, Tenderloin and A Tree Grows in Brooklyn. He directed or produced dozens of Broadway productions, including A Funny Thing Happened on the Way to the Forum; On the Town; Call Me Madam: Wonderful Town; Once Upon a Mattress: Take Her, She's Mine; Pal Joey; High Button Shoes and Flora, the Red Menace. He won six Tony Awards and numerous other theatre accolades. Abbott died at the age of 107 in 1995. The lifetime achievement award given yearly by the Society of Stage Directors and Choreographers Foundation is known as the 'Mr Abbott Award' in his honour.

RICHARD BISSELL

Book

Richard Bissell was born in Dubuque, Iowa in 1913 and graduated from Phillips Exeter Academy and Harvard College. He went from Exeter and Harvard to become an ordinary seaman, then secured a mate's and pilot's license for tonnage on the Mississippi and Monongahela rivers, the first author so distinguished since Mark Twain. His first novel, A Stretch on the River, won immediate critical acclaim. His second, 7 1/2 Cents, was a Book-of-the-Month selection which Bissell and George Abbott adapted for the Broadway musical. The Pajama Game. With his wife and Abe Burrows he wrote Say, Darling, another Broadway success based on one of his novels. Mr Bissell's other writings include High Water, Goodbye Ava, You Can Always Tell a Harvard Man, How Many Miles to Galena? and My Life on the Mississippi.

RICHARD ADLER

Music and Lyrics

The Co-composer/Lyricist of the Tony Award-winning The Pajama Game and Damn Vankees, Richard Adler also received a Tony nomination for Kwamina, his musical about Africa. He is the recipient of two Donaldsons, two Variety Critics, the London Evening Standard, as well as the coveted Honorary Ranger Award for his symphonic work, Wilderness Suite. His songs include 'You Gotta Have Heart', 'Hey There', 'Hernando's Hideaway', 'Whatever Lola Wants', 'Rags to Riches', 'Steam Heat', 'Everybody Loves a Lover', which have sold more than 35 million records. During the Kennedy and Johnson years, Richard Adler was appointed White House Consultant of the Arts and staged many 'Presidenticals'. In recent years he was awarded an honorary Doctor of Music and Theatre degree by Wagner College. This year he received the first Lifetime Achievement Award from the University of North Carolina.

JERRY ROSS

Music and Lyrics

Jerry Ross' Broadway musicals include The Pajama Game (Tony Award, Donaldson Award, Variety Drama Critics Award), Damn Jankees (Tony Award, Donaldson Award, Variety Drama Critics Award) and John Murray Anderson's Almanac. The songs 'Hernando's Hideaway' and 'Hey There' (from The Pajama Game) also topped the hit parade, simultaneously capturing the top two spots and setting a precedent in music business history. Jerry Ross also wrote more than 250 pop songs, with multiple top-selling records, including the longstanding hit 'Rags to Riches'. At the time of his death, he had the number-one and number-two shows running on Broadway. He was 29 years of age, Jerry Ross was admitted posthumously to the Songwriters Hall of Fame.

DARREN NATALE

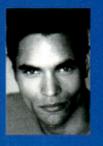
