

Part One: How George, Ira and Ethel Got Rhythm and Beat Old Man Trouble

New York 1930. Broadway stepped gingerly into the new decade. The stock market had crashed in October 1929, and many of Broadway's greatest producers were in trouble. Talkies and radio weren't helping, either.

Audiences needed laughter, so the stars of the early 1930s musicals were not the singers and dancers; they were the comedians. Romantic shows like Romberg's Nina Rosa, Friml's Luana and Youmans' Smiles all failed. Rodgers and Hart had a hit with Simple Simon,

but as far as musical theatre was concerned, the year 1930 definitely belonged to George and Ira Gershwin.

The Gershwins wrote the very first show to hit Broadway in 1930, Strike Up the Band. It ran for 191 performances, in an era when anything over 200 was exceptional.

In 1930 George Gershwin was 32. Ira, his lyricist brother, was 34. They already had a formidable list of successes: Primrose and Lady, Be Good!

(1924), Tip-Toes (1925), Oh, Kay! (1926), Funny Face, Rosalie and Treasure Girl (1927), Show Girl (1929) and various editions of George White's Scandals. As well, George had scored with 'Rhapsody In Blue' (1924), the 'Concerto in F' (1925) and 'An American In Paris' (1928).

After Strike Up the Band settled in, George and Ira embarked on yet another musical. This was Girl Crazy, and it turned out to be one of their happiest hits. The book was by John McGowan, an actor and composer turned librettist, and Guy Bolton, who had worked with the Gershwins on Rosalie. The story was pure hokum: a New York playboy turns his family's farm into a roistering

> dude ranch, complete with a troupe of Broadway chorus girls.

The producers, Alex A. Aarons and Vinton Freedly, had commissioned five earlier shows from the Gershwins, and they'd worked frequently with comedian Bert Lahr. When he turned down the lead, they signed a veteran vaudeville duo, Willie and Eugene Howard. As things turned out, only Willie was used in the

show, but Eugene still turned up every week to collect his pay.

The romantic male lead went to a Broadway favourite, Allen Kearns. Another early recruit was a lively teenager named Ginger Rogers. But the casting decision that ensured that Girl Crazy would open a new chapter in Broadway history came almost at the last minute.

The role of Frisco Kate, a brassy saloon singer, went to a virtually unknown 21-year-old; her name was Ethel Merman.

The show premiered in Philadelphia on 29 September 1930. George Gershwin conducted the orchestra, which featured future jazz greats like Red Nichols, Benny Goodman, Glenn Miller, Jimmy Dorsey, Jack Teagarden, Georgie Stoll and Gene Krupa. Roger Edens was the pit pianist.

After a final polishing, Girl Crazy opened at the Alvin Theatre in New York on 14 October. The score was vintage Gershwin: 'Could You Use Me?', 'Embraceable You', 'Treat Me Rough', 'But Not For Me', 'Bidin' My Time' and Merman's three big songs, 'Sam and Delilah', 'Boy! What Love Has Done For Mel' and the monumental 'I Got Rhythm.'

'I was just a young punk kid then,' Merman recalled, 'and I'd never

been nervous in my life. I just let go. I plunged into "I Got Rhythm". On the second chorus I just held the "I" - one long note - while the orchestra played the tune. And the audience went "Pow!" For a minute I thought I'd lost something I shouldn't, Didn't



dare look down! But I hadn't heard anything yet. They started clapping after about four bars, clapping, clapping, clapping, and they didn't stop till I'd done I don't know how many encores."

Girl Crazy was a hit! It ran for 272 joyous performances, and would have gone longer if a severe heat-wave and the economic downturn hadn't taken their toll. There

was no tour. The Depression had decimated out-of-town audiences, and both Willie Howard and Ethel Merman were lured by George White to star in the 1931 edition of his Scandals.

A couple of years later George Gershwin wrote a set of variations on 'I Got Rhythm' for piano and orchestra, and dedicated it to Ira. In 1934 he toured the country, introducing the variations to audiences in 28 cities.

The screen rights to Girl Crazy were snapped up by RKO. The film used only three of the stage songs, plus a newly-commissioned number, 'You've Got What Gets Me'. By the time it was released, the voque for screen musicals had passed, and RKO's Girl Crazy slipped into obscurity.

A decade later, MGM remade Girl Crazy as a vehicle for a new generation

of energetic talent: Mickey Rooney, Judy Garland, Nancy Walker, June Allyson and the Tommy Dorsey Orchestra, In 1965 an unfortunate re-hash, When the Boys Meet the Girls, featured Harve Presnell and Connie Francis, along with guest

stars like Herman's Hermits, Louis Armstrong, Sam the Sham and even Liberace.

The Gershwins worked on another Hollywood film, the now-forgotten Delicious, and had other hit shows and movies before George's death in 1937, but none recaptured the excitement, the exuberance and the sheer joyousness of Girl Crazy and its perennial hit, 'I Got Rhythm'. As Brooks Atkinson said in his original review: 'All the old staples are in it, and all the standard performing parts from heroine to secondary

comic. But the book, the lyrics and the music have been written with so much relish, and the performers infected with the same spirit that Lo! musical comedy appears to actually be worth a playgoer's time.'

Part Two: How Roger and Elizabeth Fell 'Neath the Spell and got Starlight and Sweet Dreams

New York 1992. After 62 years, Girl Crazy was back on Broadway! Well, not quite. This was a new Girl Crazy, with a new title, Crazy for You.

The creation of Crazy for You can be traced back to George Gershwin's 1934 concert tour. After his Cincinnati appearance, George was invited to the home of the Horchows.

local music lovers. While Gershwin played his Second Prelude on the family's piano, their five-year-old son, Roger, eavesdropped from his upstairs bedroom. The encounter led to a lifelong love of Gershwin's music.

After a successful career in retailing, Roger Horchow sold his business and decided to try his luck as a Broadway producer. He set his sights on Girl Crazy, his favourite Gershwin show, mindful that previous attempts to revive it had foundered because of problems with the book.

Horchow teamed with Elizabeth Williams, another Gershwin devotee. They decided that the show would work only if the original book were totally revised. To their astonishment and delight, the custodians of the Gershwin estate agreed. In fact, this was the last major project approved by Mrs Ira Gershwin before her death in August 1991. Not only could Horchow and Williams alter the book and re-work the score,


they were at liberty to

interpolate any other Gershwin songs, apart from those from Porgy and Bess and the three so-called 'political' musicals, Strike Up the Band, Of Thee I Sing and Let 'Em Eat Cake. As a gesture of support, Tommy Krasker, the official Gershwin archivist, came on board as musical consultant.

Horchow and Williams commissioned a fresh book from Ken Ludwig, writer of the play Lend Me a Tenor. The new plot had the show's hero sent out west to foreclose on a theatre, which the locals try to save in the best Judy-Mickey tradition – by putting on a show! The man chosen to direct

this effervescence was Mike Ockrent, previously responsible for the wildly successful revival of Me and My Girl. Their choreographer was Susan Stroman, noted for her work on the Kander and Ebb revue And the World Goes Round and Liza Minnelli's sensational Radio City Music Hall show.

The team decided to retain five numbers from the original Girl Crazy score: 'Bidin' My Time', 'Could You Use Me?', 'Embraceable You', 'I Got

Rhythm' and 'But Not For Me'. They added the lovely 'Someone to Watch Over Me', from the 1926 musical Oh, Kay!. Tommy Krasker came up with 'Tonight's the Night' and 'What Causes That?'. Previously unheard, they were discovered in a Warner Bros music warehouse in 1982. Then they added other unfamiliar numbers, 'The Real American Folk Song Is a Rag' (1918, and the Gershwin brothers' oldest surviving collaboration), 'Naughty Baby' and a forgotten song from 1928's Treasure Girl, 'K-ra-zy For You', which gave the new show its title.

As well, Crazy for You featured seven songs from the last year of George Gershwin's life, when he and Ira were creating scores for Fred Astaire movies. These are 'Shall We Dance?', 'They Can't Take That Away From Me' and 'Slap That Bass' from Shall We Dance, and 'I Can't Be Bothered Now', 'Things Are Looking Up', 'Stiff Upper Lip' and 'Nice Work If You Can Get It' from A Damsel in Distress.

They finished up with a fresh new musical in which some of the greatest show songs ever written are closely integrated into a fast-moving story of youth and hope and fun. Elizabeth Williams described it as 'sort of Preston Sturges and Kaufman and Hart meet Busby Berkeley and the Marx Brothers in an MGM musical. A feast for the eyes and the ears and the funny bone.'

Crazy for You 'tried out' in Washington D.C. towards the end of 1991. It was a smash. After further polishing, it premiered triumphantly at the Shubert Theatre in New York on 19 February

1992. It ran for 1622 performances and garnered three Tony Awards®, including Best Musical. In London it won the Olivier Award for Best Musical of 1993.

Not only were George and Ira Gershwin joyously back on Broadway, their 'new' show spearheaded a series of revivals that provided contemporary audiences with potent proof of the riches of classic American musical theatre.

Crazy for You came to Australia in 1996.
'Oodles of honest charm and freshness,'
said the Sydney Morning Herald's James

Waite of the production co-presented by John Frost, Adelaide Festival Centre, Phillip Emanuel Productions and Queensland Performing Arts Trust. Directed by Mike Ockrent, it premiered at the Theatre Royal, Sydney, on 9 November with a cast headed by Georgie Parker and import Jim Walton, who had played Billy in the Toronto production. They were supported by Peter Carroll, Marty Fields, Stuart Wagstaff, Helen Buday and Sheila Bradley. When injury forced Walton to withdraw, he was replaced by Todd McKenney.

After just over a year in Sydney, Crazy for You reached the State Theatre in Melbourne in November 1997. By then, the line up had changed considerably. Philip Gould and Fiona Benjamin were the leads, with John O'May, Bob Hornery, Anne Wood, Val Jellay and, again, Marty Fields.

Mike Ockrent tells of overhearing a couple talking in the Shubert foyer after the show. The woman asked, 'Are George and Ira Gershwin still alive?' 'They must be,' said her husband. 'They're still writing musicals.'

Who could have asked for anything more!

GEORGE GERSHWIN Music and Lyrics

George Gershwin was born in Brooklyn, NY, on September 26, 1898 and began his musical training when he was 13. At 16 he guit high school to work as a "song plugger" for a music publisher and soon he was writing songs himself. Swannee, as introduced by Al Jolson, brought George his first real fame and led to his writing a succession of 22 musical comedies, most with lyrics by his older brother, Ira. The Gershwins' shows include Lady, Be Good!, Oh Kay!, Strike Up The Band, Girl Crazy and the Pulitzer prize-winning Of Thee I Sing. From his early career, George had ambitions to compose serious music. These ambitions were realised in some of his masterpieces of American music, among them Rhapsody in Blue, Concerto in F, An American in Paris and Second Rhapsody. In the late twenties, George became fascinated by the DuBose Heyward novel Porgy, recognising it as a perfect vehicle for opera using jazz and blues idioms. George's folk opera Porgy and Bess opened in Boston on September 30, 1935 and had its Broadway premiere two weeks later. In 1937 George was at the height of his career. In Hollywood, working on the score of The Goldwyn Follies, he collapsed and on July 11 died of a brain tumour. He was not quite 39 years old.

IRA GERSHWIN Music and Lyrics

Ira Gershwin, the first song-writer to be awarded the Pulitzer Prize, was born in New York City on December 6, 1896. In 1917 The Evening Sun published his first song lyric You May Throw All The Rice You Desire But Please Friends, Throw No Shoes. Four years later, Ira enjoyed his first major stage success, Two Little Girls In Blue, written with another Broadway newcomer, Vincent Youmans. In 1924 Ira and his brother, George, created the smash hit Lady, Be Good

and went on to continue their remarkable collaboration through a dozen major stage scores, producing such standards as Fascinating Rhythm, The Man I Love, S Wonderful, Embraceable You, I Got Rhythm, But Not For Me and others far too numerous to mention. During his long career, Ira also enjoyed productive collaborations with such composers as Harold Arlen, Vernon Duke, Kurt Weill, Burton Lane and Jerome Kern, with whom he created his greatest hit song of any one year, Long Ago and Far Away. Ira Gershwin died on August 17, 1983, in Beverly Hills, California.

KEN LUDWIG

Ken Ludwig is the author of Lend Me A
Tenor, which ran for more than a year each on
Broadway, in London and Paris. In London it was
nominated for the Olivier Award as Comedy
of the Year. On Broadway it was nominated for
seven Tony Awards®, including Best Play, and
won two Tonys®, four Drama Desk Awards and
three Outer Critics Circle Awards. Mr Ludwig
recently completed a screenplay of Lend Me A
Tenor for Columbia Pictures.

Another of his plays Sullivan & Gilbert, was voted Best Play of 1988 by the Ottawa critics. He co-wrote the 1990 Kennedy Center Honors for CBS (which was nominated for an Emmy Award), and his next assignment is to write the sequel to Dirty Rotten Scoundrels for Steve Martin and Michael Caine.

He also wrote Moon Over Buffalo, which has recently completed a season on Broadway.

Mr Ludwig was educated at Haverford College, Harvard Law School and Cambridge University. He is on the counsel with the law firm Steptoe & Johnson, is on the board of trustees of the Shakespeare Theatre at the Folger and is a member of the artists committee of the Kennedy Center Honors. He is married and lives in Washington, DC.





Andrew Baker

Andrew studied musical theatre at WAAPA and received the Hal Leonard Award at his showcase in 2008. In his first year, Andrew was selected as a soloist at the Geoff Gibbs Theatre dedication with Hugh Jackman. At WAAPA he performed in West Side Story, Hello Again, Oklahomal, Blood Brothers and Sondheim's Sweeney Todd.

Other professional performances include Annie Get Your Gun at His Majesty's Theatre in Perth and the WA Opera productions of Nostradamus and Wagner's Gotterdammerung. He recently performed in the workshop production of Flowerchildren for Magnormos at Theatreworks



Taela Naomi Brooks

Hester has appeared in Little Me, Sweet Charity, High Society, Anything Goes, Call Me Madam and Funny Girl for The Production Company.




TERENCE O'CONNELL
