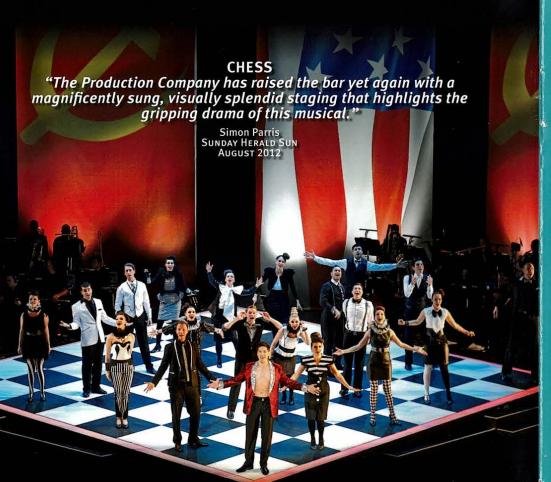

Welcome to Promises, Promises. The book was written by one of the all time great Broadway writers Neil Simon. The Production Company has previously had the pleasure of presenting three of his shows, Little Me, Sweet Charity, and They're Playing Our Song.

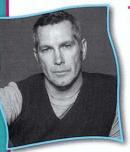

PROMISES WELL KEPT

FRANK VAN STRATEN ENJOYS A BRIEF ENCOUNTER WITH A LANDMARK MUSICAL.

As we all know, Promises, Promises is a musical version of the brilliant Billy Wilder film The Apartment. But the show's back-story isn't that simple.

In fact, we can trace its lineage back to 1936, and to 'The Master' - Noël Coward.

In 1935 Coward conceived the idea of *Tonight at 8.30*, a collection of six short plays written for himself and Gertrude Lawrence. It was a typically novel idea: each performance would feature three of the plays. Following a provincial tryout, Tonight at 8.30 reached London in January 1936. It was an immediate hit. After a few weeks, Coward decided to add another three plays to the cycle. One of them was called Still Life.

Still Life starts with an accidental meeting between a housewife, Laura, and a married doctor, Alec. An intense relationship develops and Alec 'borrows' a friend's apartment so they can continue to meet in secret. Coward later claimed, Still Life was the most mature play of the whole series I am proud to have written it.'

In 1945 Coward adapted Still Life for the screen. It became Brief Encounter, one of the most celebrated British films of its era.

American director Billy Wilder was a great admirer of Brief Encounter. He himself had wanted to make a film about adultery, but it wasn't until the 1950s, when Hollywood's strict production code was relaxed, that such a project became possible.

In 1959 Wilder had an enormous success with Some Like It Hot, which he directed and co-wrote

and co-produced with I.A.L. Diamond. It had starred Marilyn Monroe, Tony Curtis and Jack Lemmon. Wilder and Diamond wanted to create another starring role for Lemmon - and that opened the door to The Apartment.

As a starting point, Wilder borrowed Noël Coward's plot. He and Diamond combined this with echoes of a real life Hollywood scandal involving producer Walter Wanger, his actress wife Joan Bennett, and Jennings Lang, her highprofile agent. In 1951 Bennett and Lang had conducted a

passionate affair in the apartment of a junior studio employee, and Wanger had shot and wounded Jennings. Diamond also drew on the experience of one of his friends, a man who broke up with his girlfriend, then found her suicided in his bed.

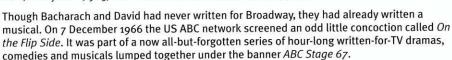
With Jack Lemmon, Shirley MacLaine and Fred MacMurray as its stars, The Apartment was a commercial and critical hit. It was nominated for ten Academy Awards, and won five, including Best Picture, Best Director and Best Screenplay. In 1994. The Apartment was deemed 'culturally, historically, or aesthetically significant' by the US Library of Congress and selected for preservation in the

Lobby card for The Apartment, 1 National Film Registry.

It was the brilliant playwright Neil Simon who thought of transforming The Apartment into a Broadway musical. Simon had written many

blockbuster Broadway comedies, as well as the musicals *Little Me* (1962) and *Sweet Charity* (1966). He put the idea to David Merrick, the mercurial Broadway producer whose long list of credits included *Hello, Dolly* (1964). At the time, Merrick was looking for a musical to block out memories of his 1966 disaster *Breakfast at Tiffany's*. Based on the much-loved Audrey Hepburn film, it had 'died' while still in previews.

Once Merrick had warmed to the idea, Simon suggested that Burt Bacharach and Hal David would be the ideal composers. Bacharach and David had 'the magic touch'. Their extraordinary string of hits already included 'The Story of My Life' (1957), 'Magic Moments' (1958), 'I Just Don't Know What to Do With Myself' (1962), 'Wives and Lovers' (1963), 'Anyone Who Had a Heart' (1963), 'Walk On By' (1964), 'There's Always Something There to Remind Me' (1964), 'What the World Needs Now' (1965), 'What's New, Pussycat?' (1965) and 'Trains and Boats and Planes' (1966).



Burt Bacharach and Hal David wrote the songs for *On the Flip Side*, in which Ricky Nelson played a washed-up rock star seeking to revive his crumbling career. The show created little impact, though a few died-in-the-wool Bacharach and David fans claim that it was the world's first rock musical. One of its songs, 'They Don't Give Medals to Yesterday's Heroes', was recorded by Dionne Warwick.

It took all of Merrick's considerable powers of persuasion to convince Bacharach and David to come on board. 'Merrick is very astute,' said Bacharach. 'He told me the theatre was going to change – that it had to open up to people to do their own thing. And he was thinking correctly.' Bacharach was also influenced by composer Jule Styne, who had said that a popular music composer had achieved nothing unless he had a successful Broadway musical to his credit.

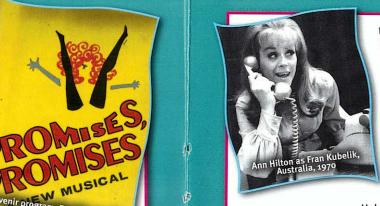
It was Neil Simon who christened the show *Promises*, *Promises*; it was a bizarre choice as it had been used only six years before for a grubby Hollywood B picture in which Jayne Mansfield had infamously bared her bountiful breasts.

The 'legit' Promises, Promises followed the recent Broadway successes How to Succeed in

Business Without Really Trying (1961) and I Can Get it for You Wholesale (1962), both of which explored devious ways to get ahead in the corporate world. What made Promises, Promises different – and groundbreaking – was its score, and the way it was performed. Bacharach and David wanted the theatre experience to replicate the unique sound they created in the recording studio.

This had its drawbacks. Bacharach and David were used to working in a studio until they obtained perfection – and the resulting single or album was there for all





time. They soon found that working for the stage was significantly different. After six or seven solid months they signed off on the score – only to find that it had to be revised and reworked, over and over. Songs were dropped or moved; new ones had to be written and added. Bacharach found the process tortuous, especially as he hated the necessary separation from his actress wife Angie Dickinson. She stayed in Beverly Hills with their young daughter, while he and David toiled away on the East Coast. David, in contrast, really enjoyed himself. 'I loved working on it,' he said. 'It was fun right from the start.'

Eventually, during the show's 'try-out' in Boston, Bacharach went down with pneumonia. While he was in hospital, the production team decided the second act needed a new number. Hal David came up with a lyric cheekily incorporating the lines 'What

do you get when you fall in love?/You get enough germs to catch pneumonia...' Bacharach responded with a memorable melody – and *Promises*, *Promises* got one of its most remembered songs.

The Broadway cast of *Promises*, *Promises* was led by Jerry Orbach as Chuck Baxter, Jill O'Hara as Fran and Edward Winter as Sheldrake. It was directed by Robert Moore. Michael Bennett, who choreographed, and Jonathan Tunick, who supplied the orchestrations, were at the start of what were to be brilliant careers. But the show's secret ingredient was its sound – it was designed by Bacharach and David's audio engineer, the legendary Phil Ramone, and replicated the sound that he created for their recordings – complete with a multi-channel mixer and backing singers in the pit.

On 1 December 1968 Promises, Promises made its Broadway debut at the Shubert Theatre. The New York Times hailed 'The wittiest musical in years... Mr Bacharach introduced to Broadway not only the insistently rhythmic, commercial-jingle buoyancy of 1960s soft-core radio fare, but also a cinematic use of Teflon-smooth, offstage backup vocals.' The New York Post called it 'A musical comedy of exceptional quality... witty and sparkling'. UPI agreed: 'One of the happiest events on Broadway in a long time.'

Promises, Promises was nominated for seven Tony Awards and garnered two – Best Actor (Jerry Orbach) and Best Featured Actress (Marion Mercer).

The show played to packed houses for just short of four years, closing after 1281 performances. A touring company trundled around the United States for several years.

In 1969 *Promises*, *Promises* was produced in London with Tony Roberts and Betty Buckley in the leads. It had a 560-performance run. Sean Hayes and Kristen Chenoweth headed the cast of a major Broadway revival in 2010. For this production the score was boosted by the addition of two more Bacharach—David standards, 'I Say a Little Prayer' and 'A House Is Not a Home'.

Promises, Promises reached Australia in 1970, thanks to 'The Firm' – J.C. Williamson Theatres Ltd. As was usual in those days, the stars were imports: Orson Bean and Ann Hilton. Mr

Bean's Broadway credits included two David Merrick shows, I Was Dancing and Subways are for Sleeping, which had earned him a Tony Award nomination. Chicago-born Ann Hilton was already familiar face on the Sydney club scene and in TV variety.

The secondary leads were played by local stars Bruce Barry and Nancye Hayes – who would have been more than capable in the leading roles. Among the featured players were Lesley Baker, Joan Brockenshire, Neville Burns, Gail Esler, Clive Hearne, Gordon McDougall, John Preston, Judith Roberts, Isabel Ryan, Brendan Tobin and Richard Webb.

The director was Fred Hebert, whose previous JCW credits included *Sweet Charity* (with Nancye Hayes) and *Funny Girl* (with Jill Perryman and Bruce Barry).

Williamson's spent \$10,000 on new sound equipment, including 15 microphones, a 15-channel mixer, and a reverb unit. The mikes were installed along the front of the stage and in the pit, which housed an orchestra of 24 and four backing singers. The pit was covered to help simulate studio sound, while the conductor, Brian Buggy, was encased in a clear plastic bubble.

The show got off to a good start at Her Majesty's in

Melbourne on 15 August 1970. The Sun's Howard Palmer
said it had 'the funniest script of any musical I've seen,'

Leonard Radic, in The Age, announced that 'The Promises were well kept,'

but *The Australian's* Katharine Brisbane took objection to some of the language.

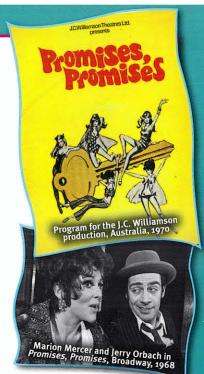
After nine weeks, *Promises*, *Promises* moved to the Theatre Royal in Sydney. Here the reception was not quite so rosy. *The Sydney Morning Herald's* Romola Costantino asked: 'Why is there no orchestra, but a very queer amplification with Brian Buggy tucked away under a plastic bubble like a gunner in a bomb turret, conducting invisibly produced sounds out of loud speakers.' This prompted a speedy response from Sydney G. Irving, Williamson's deputy general manager: 'There is certainly a live orchestra... this is a modern approach to give stereo sound, and it is how Mr Bacharach scored this particular show...'

Promises, *Promises* ran for twelve weeks in Sydney, but did not tour to other capitals. The principals returned home – Miss Hilton to the nightclub and summer stock circuit, and Mr Bean to several years touring the US in road companies of *Promises*, *Promises*, followed by a long career in Hollywood, culminating in the continuing role of Roy Bender in *Desperate Housewives*.

Promises, *Promises* is unique – a true 'one off', a stylistic bridge between the old Broadway and the new, introducing modern music and modern sound, and catching Neil Simon, Burt Bacharach and Hal David at the peak of their creativity. Neil Simon, of course, went on to write many more hit comedies but, for better or worse, *Promises*, *Promises* remains Bacharach and David's only Broadway score. David, it seems, would have been happy to continue, but not Bacharach. He found the creative journey exhausting, and he was not prepared to embrace the social and stylistic revolution wrought by *Hair* – which, ironically, grabbed the Best Musical Tony that might otherwise have gone to *Promises*, *Promises*.

That's show business.

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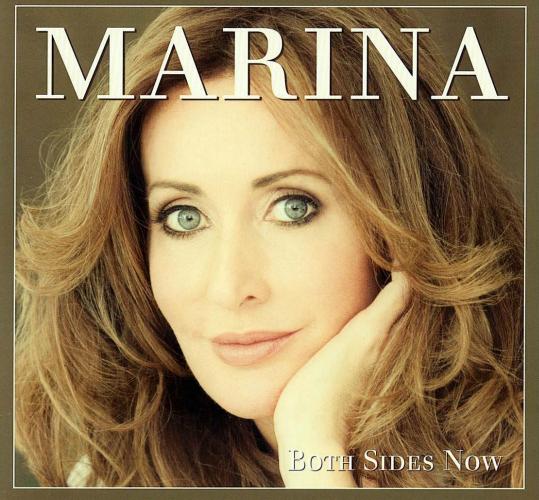
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
