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ANNE WOOD Phyllis Rogers Stone

Anne's career began with the original Melbourne cast of *CATS* and continued with the first national Australian tour of the production before joining the German company.

She spent six successful years working in London and Germany with A Swell Party marking Anne's London West End debut. Other U.K. and European credits include leading roles in Aspects Of Love, Barnum, Crazy For You, Romance Romance, Into The Woods and Closer Than Ever.

Since returning to Australia, Anne appeared in Jacques Brel Is Alive & Well & Living In Paris, as Irene in Crazy For You and Elsa in The Sound of Music – both performances earning her Green Room nominations.

Anne spent nearly three years playing the lead role of Donna in the original smash hit production of MAMMA MIA! earning a Green Room Award and an invitation to play the role on London's West End.

Since then she has appeared in Closer Than Ever at the Adelaide Cabaret Festival directed by Maltby and Shire, Carousel for The Production Company, in concert nationally with Australia's Leading Ladies, the highly acclaimed Minefields And Miniskirts and Menopause. The Musical.

She is currently appearing in *cabaret* with Shaun Murphy of *Combo Fiasco* fame.



JOHN DIEDRICH Benjamin Stone

John has a career in acting, directing and producing in theatre, musical theatre, film and television that spans over 30 years. His theatre credits include South Pacific for both Seabiscuit Productions and The Production Company, Speaking in Tongues for Hit Productions, Mack & Mabel for The Production Company, The Sydney Theatre Company's Dead White Males, Melbourne Theatre Company's High Society, Wolf at the Playbox Theatre and the role of Billy Flynn in Chicago. He performed in Sweet Charity, directed by David Atkins, Other musical theatre credits include Les Miserables. Oliver!, Grease, The Twenties and All That Jazz and Oklahoma! John was nominated for an Olivier Award for Best Actor in a Musical for his role of Curly. In 1993, he appeared on London's West End in the role of Frank Butler in Ronald Lee's production of Annie Get Your Gun.

In 1987, John co-produced, directed and starred Nine. John was nominated as Best Director of a Musical in the Sydney Theatre Critics Awards and Nine was nominated as the Outstanding Production of the Year. John co-produced the original Australian cast album of Nine which won the ARIA award for Best Soundtrack. He has recorded five other cast albums.

In 2006 John co-produced and directed the musical *Titanic*.

His television credits include Childstar, The Challenge, Special Squad and Bluey. John has worked on Big Sky, Homicide, Matlock Police, Division 4 and Ryan.

His film credits include Dawn! and The Devil's Playground.



With more than forty years in the spotlight, Debra has amassed credentials in music, television, film and on stage that few can match. Debra first won Australian hearts as the "little girl with the big voice" on the original Young Talent Time, where she performed for four years from the age of twelve. After Young Talent Time, she moved to a recording career and had hits with He's a Rebel and Da Doo Run. During this time she also won the Australian Queen of Pop Award for two consecutive years.

With two Logie Awards to her credit, Debra's television career moved her to London and appearances on the Cliff Richard's BBC-TV series, her own ABC-TV series with John Farnham, simply titled Farnham and Byrne and her first acting role in the Sammy Award winning TV Follies.

Debra starred with Matt Dillon in *Rebel* where she dazzled and was nominated for an Australian Film Institute Award.

Debra has achieved critical acclaim as Grizabella in CATS, performed with Judi Connelli in Jerry's Girls, and in 1988 played the role of Fantine in the original Australian production of Les Miserables. In the same year she was chosen to sing the role of Fantine in the only International symphonic recording of Les Miserables.

In 1996 Debra was offered the much-coveted role as Norma Desmond in *Sunset Boulevard*. She has also starred in The Production Company's productions of *Thoroughly Modern Millie* and *Little Me*.



PHILIP GOULD Buddy Plummer

Philip's first appearance on stage was for J.C.Williamsons as a 7 year old, and on television with the ever popular *Young Talent Time*.

Philips career in theatre took off again first of all with the world premier of the Chaucer classic More Canterbury Tales and the well coveted role of Tony in West Side Story.

Living in London from 1984 – 1998, Philip performed in such shows as Nite-Club Confidential, Show Boat, Oklahoma!, Buddy, and the famous 42nd Street, also several productions of Kurt Weill's Street Scene for the English & Scottish National Opera companies. He performed his song from the show 'Moon Faced Starry Eyed' with the likes of Caroline O'Connor and Catherine Zeta-Jones, Philip was also asked to perform this song on the Olivier Awards in London with Ms Zeta-Jones.

He has performed in Australia in many shows, such as South Pacific, HMS Pinafore, Show Boat, She Loves Me, Company, Forbidden Broadway, Annie (for which he won a Green Room Award) and playing Lord Evelyn Oakleigh in Anything Goes (also nominated).

Apart from Music Man and Bye Bye Birdie for The Production Company, Philip's other recent ventures were playing the role of the Tinman in Wizard Of Oz and Crazy For You. Philip has been made an Honorary Patron of the Whitehorse Musical Theatre Group.





MONIQUE BRYNNEL Solange Lafitte

Monique Brynnel started her career in Sweden starring in productions like My Fair Lady, Dial M for Murder and Boeing-Boeing.

After a successful debut in Vienna in the leading role in *Gypsy Princess*, Monique was engaged for the title role of *The Merry Widow* in a production staged for the Olympic Games which stayed in the State Opera repertoire for eight years. She became a sought after operetta diva starring in numerous productions in Frankfurt, Hamburg, Basel, Gothenburg and Oslo.

Monique was introduced to the Australian public in the ABC TV series, *Monique and Jon*, where she appeared with her husband, Jon Weaving.

An invitation followed to sing Adele in *Die Fledermaus* with Opera Australia in the first live telecast from Sydney Opera House.

As a concert soloist Monique has appeared in Scandinavia, Europe, Russia, China, and Australia and commercial CD/Video recordings include *Die Fledermaus, World of Operetta, Heart of Vienna* and *Maid in Sweden*. Her next CD Ah, Monique will be released later this year.

Monique and husband Jon recently recorded backing vocals for *The Dukes of Windsor*, their son Jack's band.



KENNETH COLLINS Roscoe

British-born Kenneth Collins made his operatic debut in Adriana Lecouvreur at the Camden Festival in 1971. Also that year, he appeared at the Aldeburgh Festival and the Royal Opera House, to which he returned in Lucia di Lammermoor, Die Zauberflöte and with the Royal Ballet in Das Lied von der Erde. For English National Opera he has sung in Manrico in Il Trovatore, Radames in Aida, Cavaradossi in Tosca, Pinkerton in Madama Butterfly and Arrigo in Sicilian Vespers. His many roles for Welsh National Opera included Des Grieux in Manon Lescaut, Nadir in The Pearl Fishers, Calaf in Turandot, Cavaradossi and the title roles in Andrea Chenier, Ernani and Don Carlos.

He made his Australian debut as Manrico for The Australian Opera in 1983. His roles with that company included Dick Johnson in Fanciulla del West, Radames, Gustaavus in Ballo in Maschera, Carlo in I Masnadieri, Gabriele Adorno in Simon Boccanegra, Don Jose in Carmen, Alvaro in La Forza del Destino, Florestan in Fidelio, Cavaradossi, Canio in I Pagliacci, Turiddu in Cavalleria Rusticana, Macduff in Macbeth, Calaf and Otello. Roles with Victoria State Opera included Samson in Samson and Delilah, Don Carlos and, in concert, Duke of Mantua Rigoletto and Cavaradossi.

On the concert platform he has appeared with the major British and Australian orchestras.

In 1993, Kenneth Collins was awarded an A.M. for his services to opera in Australia.



JUDI CONNELLI Carlotta Campion

Judi Connelli is one of Australia's most versatile and respected performers. Her diverse career spans opera, operetta, theatre, musicals, television, cabaret and recording.

For Opera Australia, her roles have included Mrs. Lovett in Sweeney Todd, The Duchess of Plaza-Toro in The Gondoliers, Katisha in The Mikado, Golda in Fiddler on the Roof and Zozo in The Merry Widow.

Her musical theatre repertoire includes The Witch in Into The Woods, Mrs Peacham in The Threepenny Opera, Matron 'Mama' Morton in Chicago and Fraulein Schneider in Cabaret. Judi's roles for The Production Company have been Mama Rose in Gypsy and Norma Desmond in Sunset Boulevard.

In concert performances, Judi has appeared with both Melbourne and Sydney Symphony Orchestras and as one of *The Three Divas* with the Adelaide and Tasmanian Symphony Orchestras. She recently toured Australia with Suzanne Johnston in the acclaimed cabaret show *Take Two*.

Judi has received numerous awards including an Order of Australia for her contribution to the performing arts and various charities.



The opera and concert career of Melbourne soprano, Margaret Haggart began in 1972, when Welsh national opera contracted her to sing the Queen of the Night in *The Magic Flute* and Gilda in *Rigoletto*. After five seasons as Principal Soprano with English National Opera, Margaret freelanced appearing regularly with ENO, WNO, Scottish Opera, Opera North, English Music Theatre, various UK Festivals, (including *The Proms* at Royal Albert Hall) and BBC TV and Radio. She performed with Nancy Opera and the Orange Festival in France and the Santiago Opera in Chile.

Home in Melbourne in 1985, Margaret has appeared in opera performances in Italy, New Zealand, Singapore and the USA. She sings with Opera Australia, all State opera companies and major Festivals (Melbourne, Adelaide and Sydney) Orchestra's (Melbourne Symphony and Orchestra Victoria) and with ABC TV and Radio.

Margaret extraordinary repertoire spans more than 90 roles and 25 major choral / orchestral works. It includes most of Mozart's sopranos, many of Verdi's and the title roles of Madama Butterfly and Turandot, Lucrezia Borgia, Katya Kabanova and The Merry Widow.

She has premiered works by Conynhgam (Fly)
Easton (The Selfish Giant) Hurd (The Aspern
Papers) Koehne (Love Burns) and most recently
the Alen John / Andrew Upton opera Through
The Looking Glass for Victoria Opera at
Malthouse.





NANCYE HAYES Hattie Walker

Actor, dancer, singer, choreographer and director Nancye Hayes OAM began her career in JC Williamson's production of My Fair Lady in 1961. However it was the title role in Sweet Charity in 1967 that established her name. Since then she has sung and danced her way through a cavalcade of musical successes including Pippin, Irene, Annie, Chicago, Sweeney Todd and Nine. She won a Victorian Green Room Award, the Norman Kessell Memorial Award and the Sydney Theatre Critics' Circle Award for Best Actress for her performance in Guys and Dolls and a MO Award for 42nd Street. Her other stage credits include Broadway Bound, Showboat, Same Time Next Year, The Glass Menagerie, Steel Magnolias, Stepping Out, Follies in Concert, The Music Man, The Snow Queen, Eurekal, Oklahoma! and the Sydney Theatre Company's Summer Rain.

As a director, Nancye's credits include Crazy for You and The World Goes Round, Australia's Leading Ladies Concert, The Wizard of Oz, The Three Divas, Annie and Gypsy.

Nancye is honoured to have received two Lifetime Achievement awards – from the Variety Club in 1997 and from the Green Room Award Association in 2003.

During 2006/2007 Nancye was on tour with the enormously successful production of *Six Dance Lessons in Six Weeks* which co-starred Todd McKenney.

LAINE LAMONT Deedee West

Laine has had extensive experience on stage, television and film. Her training in theatre, singing and dancing was under the guidance of Betty Pounder and Graham Clarke. Her stage roles include the Tony award winning musical Me and My Girl, Nunsense and the one woman play, Dream Kitchen. Laine toured nationally in these shows. Her Adelaide Festival Theatre season of Rodeo Noir required her to yodel.

Television appearances include Denise, Good Morning Australia, Frontline, Prisoner, Neighbours and Blue Heelers.

Laine performs in cabaret with her husband Ian Pearce as *Duo Plus*.

Film credits include *The Wannabees*, and many VCA films including *Sogno d'Amore*.

Melissa's theatre credits include Jesus Christ Superstar, Les Miserables, Marry Me A Little, After The Beep, Sideshow Alley and Brigadoon. For The Production Company she has appeared in Call Me Madam, Carousel and 42nd Street. She received rave reviews for her portrayal of Killer Queen in We Will Rock You throughout Japan.

Patti Newton's long and successful career began at age four when she played the Tivoli circuit in many of that company's legendary pantomimes. She worked extensively in Melbourne radio particularly at 3XY and 3DB and moved with the Swallows Juniors to the Seven Network when television began in Australia.



CHARLES 'BUD' TINGWELL A.M. Dimitri Weisman

Charles 'Bud' Tingwell is one of Australia's most experienced actors. His career began in radio in Sydney but after flying Spitfires in World War II, he moved to the movies, scoring a role in Hollywood by age 30. A short stint in London television extended to 16 years and made him one of Britain's most famous faces. He produced TV series The Sullivans, Newlyweds, The Flying Doctors and Col'n Carpenter and directed many TV series including The Sullivans, Prisoner and Acropolis Now.

He has been the voice of various characters in Thunderbirds as well as playing lead roles in films such as Breaker Morant (1980), A Cry in the Dark (1988), The Castle (1997), Innocence (1998), Inside Story (2000), Ned Kelly (2003), Jindabyne (2005), Irresistible (co starring with Susan Sarandon) (2005), Three Blind Mice (2008), Salvation (2008) and the tele-series Changi (2001). Bud won the Best Actor Award for his role in Innocence at the Las Palmas International Film Festival in 2001. Since 1999, Bud has been touring nationally in his acclaimed one man play The Carer and written his memoirs Bud: A Life followed by a National tour of An Audience with Bud Tingwell, an intimate evening with Bud. He has won several awards including Membership of The Australian Hall of Fame, The Raymond Longford AFI Award and The Honoured Artists Award for The City of Melbourne. In 1999 Charles Tingwell was invested as A Member of The Order Of Australia.

JACK WEBSTER Theodore Whitman

Born in England, Jack's career has taken him to many parts of the world. He appeared in the West End productions of Mr. & Mrs., Promises, Promises, and the films Oliver! and Scrooge, Jack came to Australia in 1970 and has performed in many musicals including Anything Goes, The Carol Channing Show and Irene. He branched out into acting and played major roles in Gypsy, Man of La Mancha, A Chorus Line, Dames At Sea, Arturo Ui, Stepping Out, Black Comedy, Run For Your Wife, Jolson and Hollywood Bizarre. He played the role of Eddy Ryan in The Production Company's Funny Girl with Caroline O'Connor and he was the first tap-dancing Butler in Annie. In 2003 Jack was honoured to be a quest artist with the Sydney Dance Company in Graham Murphy's Tivoli.

In collaboration with Nancye Hayes he has choreographed/directed Dames at Sea, Here Comes Showtime, Gypsy and Wizard of Oz with Nikki Webster. Jack has directed and choreographed Copacabana for The Conservatorium of Music in Mackay, and performed in Top Hat Production's / NARPACA tour of Stepping Out With Fred and Ginger. Most recently Jack has performed the role of Ambrogio in The Barber Of Seville for Opera Australia and choreographed Monkey Baa's production of Milli, Jack and the Dancing Cat. Jack will be most remembered for his triple role in Hot Shoe Shuffle, which toured Australia, Japan and played for six months in London's West End.

CHRIS DURLING Young Buddy Plummer

Since graduating from the University of Ballarat (BA in Music Theatre), Chris has become a sought after young talent.

Chris appeared in the pilot Chattertime with Worth Seeing Media. He also played the title role in the national tour of Pinocchio – The Greatest "Little" Show on Earth and the role of Freddy in My Fair Lady for Arts Events.

He has toured throughout Asia as a lead vocalist for Walt Disney Special Events, and with X-Systems Entertainment in Malaysia.


Following Follies, Stephen will also be playing the role of Laurie Laurence in Little Women opposite Judi Connelli and Trisha Noble.

STEPHEN SONDHEIM Music and Lyrics

Stephen Sondheim, one of the most influential and accomplished composer/lyricists in Broadway history, was born in New York City. As a teenager he met Oscar Hammerstein II, who became Sondheim's mentor. Sondheim graduated from Williams College, where he received the Hutchinson Prize for Music Composition. His first professional musical theatre job was as the songwriter for the unproduced musical Saturday Night. He wrote the lyrics for West Side Story (1957), Gypsy (1959) and Do I Hear A Waltz? (1965), as well as additional lyrics for Candide (1973).

Musicals for which he has written both music and lyrics include A Funny Thing Happened On The Way To The Forum (1962), Anyone Can Whistle (1964), Company (1970 - 1971 Tony Award Music and Best Lyrics), Follies (1971 - 1972 Tony Award Score and New York Drama Critics Circle Award; revised in London, 1987), A Little Night Music (1973 - Tony Award Score), The Frogs (1974), Pacific Overtures (1976 - New York Drama Critics' Circle Award), Sweeney Todd (1979 - Tony Award Score), Merrily We Roll Along (1981), Sunday In The Park With George (1984 - New York Drama Critics Circle Award; 1985 Pulitzer Prize for Drama), Into The Woods (1987 - Tony Award Score), Assassins (1991) and Passion (1994 - Tony Award Score).

He composed the songs for the television production Evening Primrose (1966), co-authored the film The Last of Sheila (1973) and provided incidental music for The Girls of Summer (1956), Invitation to a March (1961) and Twigs (1971). Side By Side By Sondheim (1976), Marry Me A Little (1981), You're Gonna Love Tomorrow (1983; originally presented as A Stephen Sondheim Evening) and Putting It Together (1993) are anthologies of his work. He has written scores for the films Stavisky (1974) and Reds (1981), and composed songs for the film Dick Tracy (1990 – Academy Award for Best Song).

JAMES GOLDMAN Book

James Goldman was born in Chicago and graduated from the University of Chicago; he did postgraduate work at Columbia University. He has written numerous plays, including *Blood, Sweat and Stanley Poole* (1961; co-written with his brother, William Goldman), *They Might Be Giants* (1961) and *The Lion In Winter* (1966).

In addition to Follies (1971), he has been the bookwriter of A Family Affair (1962; co-author with William Goldman, music by John Kander), the television musical Evening Primrose (1967, music and lyrics by Stephen Sondheim) and Follies (1987, London - a re-conception of the original piece).

His screenplays include The Lion in Winter (1968 - Academy Award; British Screenwriters Award), They Might Be Giants (1970), Nicholas and Alexandra (1971), Robin and Marian (1976) and White Nights (1985, co-writer). Goldman's work for television has included an adaptation of Oliver Twist (1982), Anna Karenina (1985), Anastasia: The Mystery of Anna Anderson (1986). He is also the author of a novel, Waldorf.


A very precarious business

FOUL S

Frank Van Straten explores the unpredictable history of a Broadway phenomenon

On 14 October 1960, with her arms plaintively outstretched, Gloria Swanson posed for Time-Life photographer Eliot Elisofon amid the heartbreaking rubble of a once-great Broadway theatre. The resulting image, an iconic encapsulation of the passing of time and the inevitability of change, was one of the inspirations for *Follies*.

In 1965 Stephen Sondheim was 35 and a major Broadway figure. He'd provided the lyrics and in some cases the music for West Side Story (1957), Gypsy (1959), A Funny Thing Happened on the Way to the Forum (1962), Anyone Can Whistle (1964) and Do I Hear a Waltz? (1965); now he was ready for a new challenge.

He asked James Goldman if he had any ideas for a musical. Goldman's only previous work in music theatre had been the book and lyrics for A Family Affair, the first show for which John Kander had written a full score. It had a disappointing run in 1962, and Goldman, like Sondheim, wanted a new project.

Goldman suggested a musical about a college graduates' reunion, but after he read about a get-together of showgirls from the legendary Ziegfeld Follies, he came up with *The Girls Upstairs*, which was essentially a backstage murder mystery.

By the end of 1965 Sondheim and Goldman had a draft script and five songs ready for Hal Prince, who'd produced West Side Story and A Funny Thing... and had directed A Family Affair. 'I found the script to be awful,' Prince recalled.




Boris Aronson's set model for the original production of Follies, 1971

'It was about two men who took out two girls who were in the dressing room upstairs. They were four people self-pitying and, as far as I was concerned, pitying themselves sufficiently that I didn't have to involve myself in their problems.'

Disappointed and despondent, Goldman and Sondheim immersed themselves in other projects. Goldman put the finishing touches to what became his best-known play, The Lion in Winter, which opened on Broadway in 1966, while Sondheim busied himself with Company, which premiered in 1970. Hal Prince moved on to She Loves Me (1963) and Fiddler on the Roof (1964).

It was Prince who rescued *The Girls Upstairs*. He remembered that potent image of Gloria Swanson and realised it could provide the starting point for the stalled show. He asked Goldman to rewrite the dialogue with the same strength and vitality that he'd demonstrated in *The Lion in Winter*, and he suggested four new characters: Phyllis, Sally, Buddy and Ben who would also be represented as they had been thirty years before, thus adding a bitter-sweet dream-like quality to the show. The reunion would now be staged by their old producer as a grand finale for his theatre, which, like the characters' relationships, is about to be wrecked. And then Prince came up with a new name: *Follies*.

A year of hard work followed. The casting was a major challenge. The show's premise requires a roster of recognisable older stars who still have the powers that had made them famous.




The original line up included Alexis Smith as Phyllis, Dorothy Collins as Sally, Gene Nelson as Buddy and John McMartin as Ben.

Yvonne de Carlo, a fading movie glamour girl who was then better known as television's 'Lily Munster', played Carlotta. She was the perfect choice to sing 'I'm Still Here'. Other veterans were Fifi D'Orsay and Ethel Shutta; Fifi was a former 'French Bombshell' and Ethel was a genuine 'Broadway Baby' – she had appeared in the original Ziegfeld Follies in the 1920s. Playing the small role of Meredith Lane, and understudying de Carlo and D'Orsay, was Sheila Smith, who had starred in Fade Out – Fade In during its lacklustre Australian season in 1965.

After a month's try-out in Boston and a string of New York previews, *Follies* premiered at the Winter Garden Theatre on Broadway on 24 March 1971.

Many of the reviews were ecstatic – 'So brilliant as to be heartbreaking at times,' 'Sondheim's qualities as a theatre composer can hardly be overstated' – but others were decidedly cool.

Nevertheless Follies developed a loyal following and eventually became a cult attraction. It garnered eleven Tony Award nominations, and won seven: Best Original Score (Sondheim), Best Actress (Alexis Smith), Best Scenic Design (Boris Aronson), Best Costume Design (Florence Klotz), Best Lighting Design (Tharon Musser), Best Choreography (Michael Bennett) and Best Direction (Harold Prince and Michael Bennett); but it was Joseph Papp's production of Two Gentlemen of Verona that took that year's coveted Best Musical award.

After its 522 performances on Broadway, Follies played a week in St Louis and a lacklustre ten-week run in Los Angeles. In 1974 MGM announced an all-star film of Follies, with its locale switched from a doomed theatre to a doomed movie studio. The project was scrapped


when Hal Prince fell out with the producers.
And that, it seemed, was that.

Not quite. Follies eventually resurfaced, but not in San Francisco nor in London; it was here, in Melbourne – and it almost didn't happen!

The highly regarded Festival Theatre Company had recently staged the first Melbourne production of *Applause*. Festival stalwart Rex Callahan recalls: 'We were so overwhelmed by the number of very talented women who had auditioned that we resolved to find a show that had plenty of good female roles. *Follies* was that show.'

Even though Music Theatre International had ignored their application for rights, Festival's Follies went into pre-production early in 1978. Callahan continues: 'In desperation we phoned New York in March 1979, only to be told that the rights had been withdrawn just the day before, for two years, pending a London production. As it turned out, that production by Cameron Mackintosh didn't open until 1987!

'What was to be done? Enthusiasm was high, and Follies was the perfect show for us at that time, particularly as it was to be our 25th production.

Our first thought was to identify the British company and seek their permission for ours to go ahead. A London contact managed to glean some information that led us to Carlin Music Publishing in New York.

was the decision.

In the meantime, our president wrote a desperate letter to Music Theatre International. It began: "Now firstly you should know that I am writing this letter on my knees!" It went on to seek their assistance in obtaining permission, if necessary, from the London company; otherwise, to whom should we write? Mr Sondheim? Mr Goldman? The President...

The next problem was to get the letter there, because Australia was in the middle of a postal strike. Fortunately one of our members was flying to the US, so he took the letter with him, and posted it there.

By phone, the head of Carlin's explained that they only held the music rights and that we would have to find out who held the Grand Rights. He supplied the phone number of Sondheim's agent, Flora Roberts, and our secretary phoned her. It turned out that Sondheim had retained the Grand Rights to *Follies*. Things were beginning to look up.

Then, early in April 1979, a telegram arrived: FOLLIES PRODUCTION APPROVED LETTER FOLLOWING. MUSIC THEATRE INTERNATIONAL.' Mr Sondheim had spoken!

And so the first Australian production of Follies opened (to a standing ovation) at the Camberwell Civic Theatre on 7 September 1979. The cast included Donald Cant, Val Lehman, Jim Murphy and Bruce McBrien. Ronne Arnold choreographed and Jean McQuarrie was musical director. Rex Callahan directed.

Melbourne was treated to another Follies foray in 1993, when Tony Sheldon directed a one-night-only presentation of Follies in

Concert. This cleverly conceived version of the show had premiered in New York in 1985. Under the auspices of the Melbourne International Festival of the Arts, Sheldon assembled an outstanding cast that included Peter Adams, Sheila Bradley, Lewis Fiander, Maggie Fitzgibbon, Margaret Haggart, Nancye Hayes, Toni Lamond, Reg Livermore, Jill Perryman, Glenda Raymond, June Salter and Jeff Warren.

Five years later Follies in Concert played for three gala performances at the Sydney Opera House. This time the line up included Kerrie Biddell, Sheila Bradley, Glenn Butcher, Mitchell Butel, Judi Connelli, Terence Donovan, Robert Gard, Ron Haddrick, Nancye Hayes, Maureen Howard, Suzanne Johnston, Toni Lamond, Derek Metzger, Jill Perryman and Joan Sydney. Stephen Helper directed.


Sadly, Melbourne's next encounter with Follies in Concert was a folly indeed. The first – and only – project of a pro-am company called

the Broadway Baby Repertory Musical Theatre Group, it was staged in the Crown Casino Showroom in April 2000. The cast included Margaret Haggart, Nancye Hayes, Val Jellay, John O'May, Peta Toppano and Rowena Wallace. Reviewing the production for the Herald Sun, Michael Easton described it as 'a semi-staged performance that works brilliantly on every level.' Unfortunately, though, it wasn't on the level at all. The executive producer disappeared just before the opening night, and the show folded after only three performances. The cast were left high, dry and unpaid.

Val Jellay was philosophical: 'We love what we do,' she said, 'but show business is a very precarious business.'

That could, of course, have been a line out of Follies. Yes indeed: 'So brilliant as to be heartbreaking at times.'

ROGER HODGMAN Director

Roger Hodgman began his career with the ABC in 1965, where he directed (and occasionally wrote and produced) a variety of programmes. He worked in England and Canada between 1971-1983 where he taught acting at East 15 Drama School and the Vancouver Playhouse Acting School, conducted acting workshops, taught university and directed numerous theatre productions.


He held the position of Artistic Director of the Vancouver Playhouse for 3 years. A highlight of his time in Vancouver was working closely with Tennessee Williams on two premieres of Williams' plays. In 1988, he was appointed the Artistic Director of the Melbourne Theatre Company, where he spent a successful decade directing over fifty productions ranging from Shakespeare to contemporary works.

He has won two Green Room Awards for best Director for Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf and A Little Night Music. Other accolades include best music theatre production for Sweeney Todd (Sydney Theatre Critics Awards), while Skylight, which Roger directed as a STC/MTC co-production, was named by the Sydney Morning Herald as one of ten best productions of the decade.

Musicals Roger has directed include Sweeney Todd, Assassins, A Little Night Music and Into the Woods. For The Production Company he has directed She Loves Me, The Gilbert

and Sullivan Show, Guys and Dolls, Annie Get Your Gun, Kiss Me Kate, Thoroughly Modern Millie and Little Me. He directed She Loves Me and Bernstein's Wonderful Town for the Shaw Festival in Canada. His production of Respect, new musical based on popular songs performed by women in the twentieth century, had a very successful national tour in 2007.

Roger also works in television drama directing numerous episodes of The Secret Life of Us, MDA, Holly's Heroes, Wicked Science, CrashBurn, White Collar Blue, Blue Heelers, and Stingers. His first telemovie, Stepfather of the Bride (written by Geoffrey Atherden) was screened on ABC television and won the award for best telemovie at the Chicago Film Festival. In 2007, Roger was lead director on a new children's TV series, The Elephant Princess for Jonathon Shiff Productions/ZDF. He has just finished directing a production of the international hit play Frost/Nixon for the Melbourne Theatre Company.



GUY SIMPSON Musical Director

Guy Simpson has worked extensively as a Musical Director and Musical Supervisor for 25 years. He has had the honour of conducting the finest international artists in musical theatre, concerts and recordings. He returns to Melbourne each year for The Production Company and has conducted the concert productions of Funny Girl, Call Me Madam, Mack And Mabel, The

Music Man, They're Playing Our Song, Carousel, Oklahoma!, Camelot and Little Me.

He has been associated with *Miss Saigon* in many countries over the past 20 years and was recently Musical Supervisor of the new production in Australia.



Dana's work includes ongoing choreographer and movement consultant to Melbourne City Councils Moomba Waterfest and Parade, the workshop of a new Australian musical Nostradamus and the Australian production of Respect, with Rhonda Burchmore and Roger Hodgman. Dana recently returned from Kuala Lumpur, where she was invited to choreograph for the second time the Citrawarna Festival of Colours, celebrating Malaysia's independence, with a cast of 2,500 dancers. On her return she choreographed a new show for Rhonda Burchmore Everybody Loves Rhonda, for the Adelaide Cabaret Festival 2008, directed by Gary Young.

Dana is delighted to be working with Roger Hodgman once again on *Follies*, their 5th show together, and especially to be part of the 10 year celebrations of The Production Company.



RICHARD JEZIORNY Set Designer

Richard Jeziorny is a freelance designer who lives and works in Melbourne.

After graduating from NIDA he worked as a resident designer in New Zealand and for the Melbourne Theatre Co.

He has designed for drama, musical theatre, ballet, opera, circus and dance. He has designed several large-scale puppetry works which have toured successfully in Australia and overseas including *Inside Dry Water, Wake Baby, The Reading Boy* and *Twinkle, Twinkle Little Fish.*

He also transformed the lawn between the Concert Hall and the Arts Centre into a vibrant beach environment for the duration of the Commonwealth Games and was the designer of the Moomba Waterfest parade in 2006 and 2007.

In the past six years, Richard designed many musicals for The Production Company tackling shows such as Camelot, Kiss Me, Kate, Carousel and Sunset Boulevard, for which he won a Green Room Award for Design in the Musical Theatre category. Other musical theatre designs include Eurobeat and Sideshow Alley. Eurobeat is currently touring in South Korea and in the UK on a 20 city tour to open in the London West End in September.



In May he designed the launch of the Citrawarna festival in Malaysia for the second year running and is currently designing a new production for the Flying Fruit Fly Circus.




VICTORIA ROWELL Costume Designer








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
