'Make-believe wickedness' and genuine tenderness'

On 22 May 1955 The New York Times published this letter from a Mrs Eva Meinwald of Brooklyn:

'As a female with a long-standing aversion to baseball, brought about no doubt by having two baseball aficionados in my home, I would like to praise the new musical Damn Yankees on two counts. First, for its sympathetic treatment of the "baseball season widow" and second, and much more important, for a delightful evening of theatre in which the baseball theme is used but briefly as a prop on which a wonderful night of spoofing, make-believe wickedness and genuine tenderness are draped."

Bravo Eval

Damn Yankees was – and still is – a delightful evening of theatre. Yes, it was the first musical to be built around America's beloved game, but as canny Mrs Meinwald realised, that isn't the reason it succeeds. It is, first and foremost, a damn good show.

If you had been in New York back in September 1954, and had been lucky enough to have been in the audience for a performance of *The Pajama Game*, you might have seen producer Hal Prince lurking at the back of the stalls with a book in his hand, its jacket reversed to hide the title. Eventually he found Richard Adler and Jerry Ross, the hit show's youthful composer and lyricist. Like Prince, they had been frantically searching for a subject for a follow-up musical. The three pored over the book's first page and made up their minds there and then. Douglass Wallop's hilarious novel The Year the Yankees Lost the Pennant was exactly what they wanted.




Gwen Verdon adorns the poster for the original New York production, 1955.

The appropriately-named Wallop had deftly transformed the Faust legend into a feisty romp about America's national sport. He'd never written for the stage, but he came on board to co-write the show with director George Abbott, who also coined the new title.

Damn Yankees' gestation was extraordinarily quick and comparatively congenial. The producers decided that the seductive Lola should be played by a dancer. Both Mitzi Gaynor and Zizi Jeanmaire declined, so they offered it to Gwen Verdon, who was assisting choreographer Bob Fosse and had only sung once before, in Can-Can. She reluctantly agreed. The other principals were Ray Walston as the devilish Mr Applegate and Stephen Douglass as the soul-swapping Joe Hardy. Cast as Sister Miller was a young Jean Stapleton, later ubiquitous as Edith Bunker in TV's All in the Family.

Fosse's show-stopping male dance routines were based on his arcane knowledge of baseball moves. In contrast, designers William and Jean Eckhart had never even been to a baseball match; their costumes and sets were

the result of weeks of painstaking research in The New York Public Library.

After tryouts in New Haven and Boston, Damn Yankees bounced into Broadway's Forty-sixth Street Theatre on 5 May 1955.

Audiences loved it, and so did the critics.
The New York Times called it 'As shiny as a new baseball and almost as smooth,'
The Journal-American said it was 'Truly tremendous,' and The Daily News described it as 'a wonderful musical... an all-hitter under the lights.' Damn Yankees scored eight Tony Award® nominations and won seven – Best Actor (Walston); Best Actress (Verdon); Best Featured Actor (Russ Brown); Best Choreography (Fosse); Best Musical Director (Hal Hastings); Best Stage Technician (Harry Green) and, to top if off, the coveted Best Musical.

Damn Yankees was only the tenth musical to notch up more than 1000 performances on Broadway. It scored 1019, just a few short of




Matt Hammond in the TV series Skippy. Damn Yankees had a London run of 258 performances.

While the show was still bubbling on Broadway, J.C. Williamson's started negotiations for an Australian production. Company files preserved in the Arts Centre's Performing Arts Collection reveal that though Williamson's planned to open the show at Her Majesty's in Melbourne early in 1958, following a return season of *The Pajama* Game, the contract with the American producers was not signed until 20 November 1957. By then the show's 29-year-old lyricist Jerry Ross had died of a lung ailment called Bronchiectasis. The contract was therefore annotated with 'The Estate of' every time his name was mentioned.

its predecessor, The Pajama Game, with 1063. After the New York run, a road company criss-crossed the United States for more than two years.

London was next. Damn Yankees opened at the Coliseum on 28 March 1957. Lola was played by Belita, an English dancer, actress and former Olympic ice skater, whose real name was Maria Belita Jepson-Turner, She was uncomfortable with Fosse's choreography, so Elizabeth Seal took over the role. Ivor Emmanuel was Joe and Bill Kerr, was Applegate. A talented Australian all-rounder, Kerr started his long coreer as Little Billy Kerr, 'Australia's Jackie Coogan', went on to conquer British variety as 'the Boy from Wagga Wagga', and found fame as a member of the Hancock's Half Hour household on BBC radio. Another Australian, Ed Devereaux, played Smokey; he was later

Williamson's acquired the Australian rights to Damn Yankees for 8% of the gross box office receipts and an advance of \$2500, and the Americans had to approve the director and principal actors.

That wasn't unusual. What was odd was that, though the contract stipulated that the Broadway designs would be used, the Eckharts proved reluctant to release anything. Eventually Williamson's agreed to pay them a special fee of \$1000 for a set of 'chromochrome copies or duplicate colour drawings, preferably the latter.' In the end the Eckharts airmailed the originals, on the proviso that Williamson's insured them for \$20,000.

Even more odd was the contract stipulation that whoever was chosen to direct the Australian production had to receive exactly the same salary as that paid to Fred Hebert, the American who'd directed Williamson's production of The Pajama Game. Furthermore, Williamson's had to undertake 'to use their best efforts to obtain an American girl to play the part of Lola and that she was to be paid a salary of up to \$300 a week'.

This put paid to press speculation that, like The Pajama Game, the down-under Damn Yankees would feature an all-Australian cast – and that Bill Kerr would come home to be the Australian Applegate.

As it turned out, our Applegate was Alton Harvey; his versatility stretched from vaudeville to Shakespeare, but this was his first principal role. Our Lola was a young New Yorker called Barbara Newman, She'd had a few roles in summer stock, but her only Broadway experience was as a dancer in the Bells are Ringing company. She was to receive 'first star billing' and the agreed \$300 per week; most of the company was on \$30-\$40, and you could buy a front stalls seat for just under \$2. Our Joe Hardy was another import, Warren Brown. A former movie stuntman, he'd had tiny roles in the Broadway productions of South Pacific, Pipe Dream and Happy Hunting.

All the other roles went to Australians. They included operatically trained Wilma Whitney

(Meg), Ormonde Douglas (Joe Boyd), Frank Wilson (Van Buren), Wim Jonker (Rocky), Philip Casier (Smokey), Norma Dennis (Gloria) and Barbara Wyndon (Doris). Williamson's senior musical director, Gabriel Joffe, conducted the orchestra, and Betty Pounder staged the dances. This was her second major choreographic credit, and followed her triumph with The Pajama Game. Recruiting a team of suitable Melbourne male dancers proved so difficult that Betty had to scour Sydney and Brisbane for reinforcements.

The Australian production was directed by George Eckert. His only Broadway experience had been as stage manager for West Side Story, though he had stage managed Damn Yankees on its US national tour. His trip to Australia doubled as a honeymoon, as he'd recently married Bonnie Douglas, a svelte Seattle lady who juggled simultaneous careers as a mannequin and a film studio violinist.

The first night – 1 February 1958 – was the usual glittering affair, though social commentators noted with some disappointment that only three or four of the glamorously dressed women were long gowns, while a style called 'the sack' was

disturbingly popular. The reviews glowed.

'It simply transfixes', said Bruce Grant in The Age; 'A brilliant success', agreed Howard Palmer in The Sun. The Herald's H.A Standish suggested: 'If somebody had rewritten this show about Australian Rules football, they'd have had to build a birdcage over the orchestra to protect the players from the tributes of Melbourne fans'.


Damn Yankees enjoyed a happy
115-performance run in Melbourne,
transferred to Her Majesty's in Brisbane for
three weeks, and then moved into the Empire
in Sydney. Whether it was the unsympathetic
vastness of the theatre, the lukewarm press
reception, or a sudden spell of cold weather –
or a combination of all three – Damn Yankees
failed to excite Sydneysiders. It closed after
seven weeks.

The American imports returned home.
Neither Ms Newman nor Mr Brown had
Broadway careers of any note. They were
seen in miniscule roles in the Irving Berlin
flop Mr President, and Brown had a
stint stage managing Subways are for
Sleeping. Director George Eckert stage
managed a couple of plays and was
dialogue coach for the film of Hello,
Dolly! in 1969. And that, for our

American celebrities, was that.

But Damn Yankees lived on. The 1958 film version was directed by George Abbott and Stanley Donen. It featured most of the New York principals, though for box office reasons, Tab Hunter was brought in to replace Stephen Douglass who, incidentally, came to Australia in





1969 to star with Jill Perryman in the local production of I Do, I Do. The show's title so worried the film's overseas distributors that it was launched in Britain and Australia as What Lola Wants. A 1967 television version starred Phil Silvers as Mr Applegate with Lee Remick as Lola and Ray Middleton as Joe Boyd. Van Johnson played the role in a US tour in the late 1970s. A major Broadway revival in 1994 featured Jerry Lewis, who took the show on a long national tour, and back to the West End in 1997.

And so, as a new Lola, a new Joe and a new Mr Applegate take the stage, stand by for 'a delightful evening of theatre in which the baseball theme is used but briefly as a prop on which a wonderful night of spoofing, make-believe wickedness and genuine tenderness are draped'.

THE ORIGINAL CREATIVE GENIUSES

Words & Music by RICHARD ADLER JERRY ROSS

RICHARD ADLER was born in New York City in 1921. He received his Bachelor of Arts degree from the University of North Carolina, and served as an officer in the U.S. Naval Reserve during World War 11.

Recordings of his biggest hit songs, You Gotta Have Heart, Hey There, Hernando's Hideaway, Whatever Lola Wants, Steam Heat, Rags to Riches, Another Time, Another Place, and Everybody Loves a Lover, have sold over 30 million copies.

Mr. Adler is the recipient of numerous other awards and honors, including two Donaldson's, two Variety Critics, and The London Evening Standard Award, the University of North Carolina Playmakers Lifetime Achievement Award, November 1999, as well as the coveted National Parks Service Honorary Ranger Award (1984), for which he became the eighth recipient. Mr. Adler is a member of the Songwriters' Hall of Fame.

JERRY ROSS was born Jerold Rosenberg on March 9, 1926. As a child and young teen, he was the "hottest young property on the Jewish stage". He began writing songs while in high school, although he had no formal training in music. Subsequently he studied at New York University under Rudolph Schramm.

After penning several well-received songs, Ross met Richard Adler in 1950. They decided to team their talents, writing songs together. Ross began his career in the Broadway Theater with "John Murray Anderson's Almanac," a revue for which he and Adler wrote most of the songs. In 1954 George Abbott contracted this writing duo to write the score for a new musical about union/management relations at a pajama factory. The Pajama Game opened to rave reviews, winning the coveted Tony Award for best score.

A year later, in May 1955, the musical Damn Yankees played to equal excitement and success. This won Ross the Tony Award®, the Donaldson Award, and the Variety Drama Critics Award.

Successful films were made of both musicals, although Ross did not get to see them realized. He died on November 11th, 1955. He was 29.

Book by GEORGE ABBOTT DOUGLASS WALLOP

GEORGE ABBOTT was an actor, writer, director and producer and had one of the most active and distinguished careers in the entire history of the American theater. The longevity of his theatrical career is legendary: he began as an actor on Broadway in The Misleading Lady (1913) and continued working as a director and play doctor well into the 1980s. He had his first hit with Broadway (1926). His later directorial credits include the plays Twentieth Century (1932), Three Men on a Horse (1935), Brother Rat (1936), and Too Many Girls (1939). He directed his first musical, Rodgers and Hart's Jumbo, in 1935; in addition to A Funny Thing Happened On the Way to the Forum, a short list of musicals he directed includes On Your Toes (1936), The Boys From Syracuse (1938), Pal Joey (1940), On the Town (1944), Beggar's Holiday (1946), High Button Shoes (1947), Where's Charley (1948), Call Me Madam (1950), Wonderful Town (1953), Pajama Game (1954), Damn Yankees (1955), Once Upon a Mattress (1959), Fiorello! (1959), Tenderloin (1960), Flora, the Red Menace (1965) and On Your Toes (revival, 1983). He received numerous awards, including a Pulitzer Prize, the NY Drama Critics Circle Award, 4 Donaldson Awards, 4 Tony Awards® and he was a Kennedy Center honoree in 1983. He died in 1995 at the age of 107.

JOHN DOUGLASS WALLOP was the 17th John Douglass Wallop from an old Eastern Shore family. His love of baseball began when he was 5 years old, when his father took him to a Senators' game. A newspaper reporter by profession, he was the author of 13 novels, the second of which, The Year the Yankees Lost the Pennant, was published in 1955 and became his best known work. Wallop died in 1985.






ELIZA BRIAN

CHRIS DURLING


Since graduating from the University of Ballarat BA in Music Theatre, Chris has become a sought after young talent.




LIAM KILGOUR
